

The object of this investigation being to establish the presence or absence of cocaine, and possibly of other injurious alkaloids, I operated on quantities of three to five times the amount containeds, a butlie of the carbonated beverage. The extractions of the syrup we repeated until the alkaloids were entirely removed, and the crystan, he substance thus obtained was further separated by fractional extraotions, after which it was consentrated and tested. Since this concentrated product failed to respond to the tests for cocaine, it is clear that the alkaloid is absent, or, if present at all, then in quantities too minute to allow of detection. The active constituent of Coca-Cola Syrup proved to be caffeine, and in quantities seemingly less than in a cup of good coffee or tea.
