ALABAMA WILL HAVE TO SWALLOW HUNDLEY. (By Leased Wire to The Times.) Washington, April 9.—The political referees of Alabama, Messrs. Scott and Thompson, have won out in their fight to make Oscar R. Hundley, federal judge for the new office created by the last congress. After the cabinet meeting today it was announced that Hundley would be appointed, notwithstanding the opposition to Hundley from all parties in Alabama, including Senator Pettus who came to Washington last week to make a personal appeal to the president not to appoint Hundley.

ELECTION IN ELIZABETH CITY. (Special to The Evening Times.) Elizabeth City, N. C., April 9.—The election of city officials was held here today absolutely without incident. About twenty per cent of the city's vote will be polled. The democratic nominations were the only ones to be voted for, the republicans making no nominations; nor were there any independent candidates. The question of bonding the city for \$20,000 to discharge the floating indebtedness is also being voted on. The full count has not yet come in but the measure is undoubtedly lost. The city officials elected were: E. Everet Thompson, mayor, succeeding J. B. Leight who was incorporated as police justice in a bill passed by the last session of the legislature providing a police court for this city. Clerk R. L. Whitehurst, treasurer; W. T. Will liams, chief of police; Alfonso Bell, alderman first ward; J. B. Forchec, second ward; L. W. Anderson, third ward; T. P. Nash, fourth ward; J. H. Leary, fifth ward; C. W. Gilce, sixth ward; T. R. Parker, seventh and T. B. Hayman, all these officers succeed themselves with the exception of J. B. Forchec who succeeds M. N. Sawyer.

MILITARY INSPECTION A. & M. Cadets Inspected by Capt. M. J. Linehan

Battalion and Band Found to be in Very Good Shape—Lieut. Young Deserves Congratulations. (The annual inspection of the cadet corps of the Agricultural and Mechanical College took place this morning on the athletic field in West Raleigh. The inspection was conducted by Capt. Michael J. Linehan of the general staff at Washington, who was detailed under instructions from the War Department. There were five companies and the band on the field; Company A, Captain P. W. Hardie; Company B, Captain G. R. Hardesty; Company C, Captain G. F. Hinshaw; Company D, Captain C. L. Garner; Company E, Captain L. R. Gilbert. Captain W. N. Holt is in command of the band. Sergt. G. F. Bason is director, and Sergt. W. G. Ferguson drug major. Major W. B. Truitt commands the entire battalion. A very rigid inspection was made by Captain Linehan, of the arms, uniforms and equipment of the cadets. Although his report has not been made public, it is understood that the battalion made an excellent showing. After the inspection a review took place, followed by company and battalion drill at the direction of the inspector. Lieutenant Young, the efficient commandant at the A. and M. College, deserves exceptionally high credit for the fine showing and skillful drilling of the cadets under his training. Regular drill has been suspended for a week at the college, so that the different firing squads may complete the target practice in which they have been engaged for some time. The target range is situated a mile west of the college. Captain Linehan left this morning for Fort Knott, Va., where he will inspect the military academy of that place.

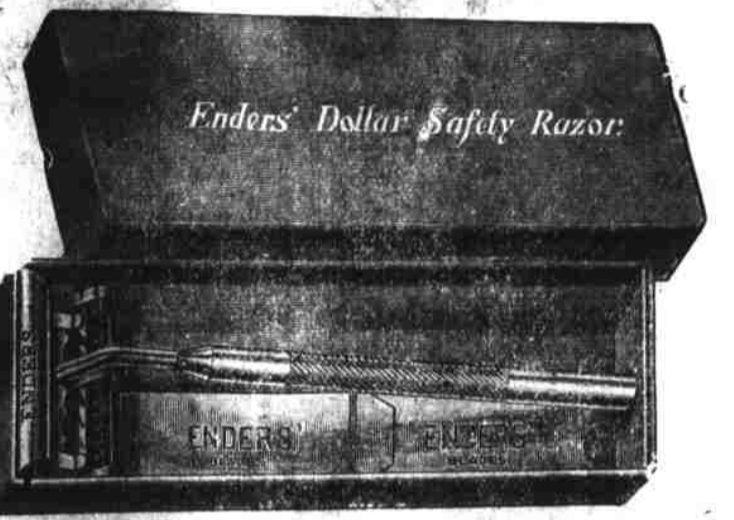
