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THE PLANS OF SECRETARY TAFT

(By Leased Wire to The Times.)
Washington, June 7.—Secretary of War Taft has completed his plans for the remainder of this year. He will leave Washington Saturday for Madison, Wis., where he will address the students of the state university on June 10, and will also attend a meeting of the merchants and manufacturers' association in Milwaukee the same evening. June 11 he will spend in Davenport, Iowa, where he will visit the United States arsenal and dine with the Tri-City Press Club. On June 12 he will address the students of the Iowa University, at Iowa City, and on the following day will visit Fort Leavenworth. On June 20th he will speak at Ottawa, Kansas, and will then start for Washington, which he expects to reach on the 23rd or 24th. The secretary hopes to leave Washington for Murray Bay, Quebec, about July 4th to remain until early in August, when he will return to Washington to close up his affairs preparatory to his departure for the Philippines, for which he will sail from Seattle about September 10th. As Mr. Taft expects to complete his annual report before going to the Far East it is likely that he will not return to the capitol until Christmas or New Year.

TENSION RELAXED BUT TROUBLE IS NOT OVER

The tension between Mexico and Guatemala is somewhat relaxed and war does not seem so imminent as it did some days ago, the situation is still very serious and it may at any time develop so that a clash cannot be well avoided.
The conditions in Guatemala as described by those who have recently been in that unhappy country are indescribably bad, a veritable reign of terror existing. They declare that men are assassinated in their own homes and their bodies flung to the buzzards on the outskirts of the city. Men, women and even children are not only flogged, but they are flogged in a manner which causes excruciating pain and produces fatal illness. Then, to add to their torment a liquid caustic is applied to their wounds, purporting to be an effort to heal them. Women who arrive at the port of San Jose are, it is said, stripped by the commandant of the port, who is also implicated with Lima in the assassination of General Barillas on the pretense of searching for letters of an incriminating nature.

THE WOMEN'S CLUB TO BLOW UP CANNON

Norfolk, Va., June 7.—Speaker Cannon of the national house of representatives, is in danger of being blown up, unless he ceases to block legislation in which the Federation of Women Clubs is interested. He should be dynamited, thinks Mrs. Mary Morton Kehew, chairman of the committee on legislation. So said Mrs. Kehew in delivering her report to the federation convention yesterday. "It seems that the committee having laws in hand experienced considerable difficulty in having them acted on at the last session of congress. It was Speaker Cannon's fault, as he retarded definite action persistently."
"He ought to be dynamited. Somebody ought to get behind him with a good big charge and set it off. They perhaps something would happen. Nothing short of dynamite would do to wake him up."
