NORFOLK & WESTERN UNDER CHEAP RATES

Major Wm. A. Guthrie and Mr. C. B. Watson, Sr. of Winston-Salem, appeared before the Corporation Commission yesterday afternoon for the purpose of discussing the passenger rate law. The attorneys made the point that the Norfolk & Western should be exempt as it has no line in the state as long as sixty miles. One branch of the Norfolk & Western runs into Durham and is known as the Lynchburg branch, and the other to Winston-Salem and is known as the Roanoke branch, each being about forty-four miles in the state. The point was raised that the Norfolk & Western was not included under the law, the part of the section in question reading as follows:

"Provided, that the Corporation Commission of North Carolina is hereby authorized and empowered to permit all independently owned and operated railroad companies in North Carolina, whose mileage of road in said state is sixty miles or under, to charge a rate for transporting passengers not in excess of the present rate fixed and prescribed for said road."

The Corporation Commission refused to grant the petition, holding that the two lines are a part of the same system and therefore cannot be considered as two independent lines.

NORFOLK'S POPULAR-PRICED HOTEL—THE DIXIE.

Mr. W. S. BOARD STARTS OUT 20TH ON INSPECTION

The State Board of Education, consisting of the governor, lieutenant governor, secretary of state, treasurer, auditor, superintendent of public instruction and attorney general, will leave here on the twentieth for the purpose of inspecting the various sites offered for the training school. The board will be at Rocky Mount and Tarboro on the 20th, at Greensboro on the 21st, Washington on the 22nd, Edenton and Elizabeth City on the 24th, New Bern on the 25th, and Kinston on the 26th.

The act passed by the last legislature providing for the establishment of the school requires that the members of the State Board of Education inspect the sites offered, but not a word is said in regard to expenses, so the members will have to pay the money out of their own pockets. It is expected that the decision will be announced soon after the board returns.

Good Church Work.

The rally held at the colored Congregational Church in Raleigh on Sunday was a great success. The total sum contributed by Rev. Mallard's congregation, with the generous donations of the other colored churches, amounted to \$252.

SHANTY CAR BURNED LAST NIGHT AT SEABOARD YARD.

WEATHER FORECAST.

Washington, D. C., June 12.—Forecast for North Carolina for 36 hours to 8 p. m. Thursday: Cloudy tonight and Thursday; warmer Thursday.

The atmospheric pressure is still high in the northeast, and it is low over the remainder of the country with centers of depression central over the central Mississippi valley and over Utah. The weather is generally cloudy except in the extreme west. Rains have fallen in most states east of the Mississippi River and in the northwest; they were, however, light except at Vicksburg where 2.29 inches were reported. In the cotton states the temperatures have fallen somewhat east of the Mississippi River where light rain has fallen; west of this river the temperatures have remained unchanged and dry weather prevails.
