ROWLAND CASE IS CONTINUED So Decided Upon by Judge Long Today FOR SEPTEMBER TERM

After Lengthy Argument This Morning Out Continues Case—Order Made to Allow Depositions That Strange Had Heart Disease to Be Used as Evidence—Dr. and Mrs. Rowland in Court.

Because the attorneys for the state in the Rowland case asked for time to meet the depositions submitted by the attorneys for Dr. and Mrs. Rowland, Judge E. F. Long this morning continued the case until the September term of Wake superior court.

While Dr. and Mrs. Rowland were seated in the bar this morning, a photographer appeared in court with a camera and attempted to get a shot at them. The attorneys caught on to the scheme and called on Judge Long to prevent a picture being taken.

Shortly before 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon Dr. and Mrs. Rowland were arraigned for the murder of Engineer Strange. They pleaded not guilty.
