 Denver, Col., July 30.—Rev. Charles St. Clair Mathews, of Hayes, Kansas, a Virginian by birth, and who was arrested by the police and later pardoned and sent to St. Anthony's Hospital, is entirely recovered from his nervous breakdown and will leave in a day or so for his home.

Mr. Mathews has no recollection of it. He says the stranger must have given it to him. He admits to having at one time been a cocaine fiend but he was cured of the evil in Kansas City, Kansas.

Mr. Mathews is thirty-nine years old. He says he was born on a farm near Norfolk, Va. His father, who is a thirty-second degree mason, was also a Baptist preacher. The whole trouble of Mr. Mathews is attributed to overstudy. He is now engaged in writing a lecture entitled, "The Underdog," based on his own experiences.

 New York, July 30.—Allie J. Angle, manager of a large department store in Bartow, Fla., who has been staying at the Herald Square Hotel for the last month with his wife and mother-in-law, was arraigned at Jefferson Street Market court today on a charge of felonious assault, perpetrated by John Jordan, a negro elevator boy in the hotel.

Angle was accompanied to the station by Governor N. B. Broward of Florida and several members of his staff who have been staying at the Navarro Hotel and who are close friends of the prisoner.

According to the story told by Angle, he and his wife had several disputes with Jordan for carrying them beyond the second floor of the hotel, where their room was, and that he could not endure the negro's insolence. It is charged that he pulled out a penknife and stabbed Jordan in the cheek.
