She was born Sallie Bruton, daughter of the late James H. Bruton, at one time mayor of St. Louis.

THE BANKERS' CONVENTION

Atlantic City, N. J., Sept. 26.—At a meeting of the American Bankers' Association yesterday great interest was taken in a contest over the secretaryship, a position which pays \$12,000 a year, and which James R. Branch, of New York, has held for eleven years. The contest developed at the nominations for the ten new members of the executive council, which appoints the secretary. Nominations for council members are equivalent to an election, as there will be no contest over the presidency. James D. Powers, of Louisville, was elected president, taking the place of G. S. Whitson, of New York. George M. Reynolds, of Chicago, now chairman of the executive council, was named for vice-president.
Those opposed to Branch made a strong fight to elect their candidates to the new council. They expect that they will be able to swing the council against Branch. Their candidate for secretary is Colonel F. E. Farnsworth, of the Michigan Bankers' Association. Although those opposed to Branch say that he will not be reappointed and may not be a candidate for secretary, Branch himself said that a majority of those chosen today are his friends. The council consists of 39 members, ten retiring each year.


HOW A MANUFACTURER ESCAPED ITS CLUTCHES
