

# THE COPS AGAIN PINCH FLOWER, \$1,000,000 THIEF

(By Leased Wire to The Times.) Philadelphia, Nov. 23.—Dr. Richard C. Flower, who is charged in New York with swindling various persons out of nearly \$1,000,000, has been re-arrested in this city upon an entirely new and unique charge of frenzied promotion.

He is charged with incorporating a company which claimed to have a patent on a device that will turn ordinary clay or dirt into telegraph poles.

He is said to have induced Dr. Charles B. Dotterer, a prominent physician of Boyertown, Penn., to part with \$2,000 for 300 shares of stock in the company, and to become its president.

Upon the strength of their names Flower is said to have obtained at least \$2,000 more from Boyertown citizens.

While in tow for Sydney, by the French steamer St. Louis, a storm snapped the cable, one end of which killed a French seaman. The St. Louis took off the crew.

(Continued from First Page.) Testimony of this character lays a sound foundation for the expert testimony, which is now planned for the defense to introduce early in the week. It is now believed that perhaps two days will be consumed in the introduction of this expert testimony on behalf of both the defense and government, after which comes the rebuttal witness of the government. The majority of whom are from Salt Lake City. Although District Attorney Fisher announced earlier in the week that the evidence would probably all be in by Thursday, it is now not apparent that it will require the entire week and that argument cannot begin before December 2.

Should this prove to be the case the verdict will perhaps be returned almost a year, to the day, from the date which Mrs. Bradley walked into the Raleigh and gave the snorter. The tragedy will be re-enacted, occurred on the afternoon of December 8.

# PRES'D'T FOR 4 NEW BATTLESHIPS

Washington, Nov. 23.—President Roosevelt is said to have recommended in his message to Congress the building of four battleships, more powerful than any now under construction. It was thought he would suggest at least half a dozen huge battleships and then create an Atlantic fleet to take the place of Admiral Evans' squadron, which leaves the east next month to look things over on the Pacific.

With the thousands who will need employment after the Atlantic fleet leaves for Pacific waters, it is argued that the country at large and the navy will be benefited. This is said to have been brought to Mr. Roosevelt's attention, and influenced him more than a little.


