

TODAY'S MARKETS BY WIRE STOCKS, COTTON AND GRAIN

ONLY FRACTIONAL ADVANCE IN STOCKS

(By Leased Wire to The Times.) New York, Nov. 23.—The stock market opened mainly higher. B. R. T. started 1/4 better, gained in all 1 1/2 and reacted 1/2. New York Central opened half higher and gained in all a point. Reading opened 5/8 better. St. Paul, Union Pacific, and Pennsylvania, 3/4 higher, and Erie 1/2 higher. Southern Pacific gained 1/4. Soo was unchanged. Ontario and Western opened 1/2 lower. Because of the announcement by Secretary Cortelyou that bids had already come in so fast as to make the new bond and loan certificate issue a success and that seventy-five per cent of the purchase prices will be left on deposit with the banks purchasing the securities, the stock market became strong today and advances were made all along the line. U. S. and Reading assumed leadership and other standard leaders immediately advanced two or three points. The tone of the stock market during the two hours of business today was one of decided strength, resulting from the important developments of the last few days in the direction of bettering the financial and speculative situation, and from the opening until to well up near the close prices advanced with an unusual degree of uniformity.

There was a strong demand for January and March on the call, but very little for sale, although offerings later loosened a little. There was much week-end covering. The weekly statistics were bearish on the average, although the into-sight figures fell far below those of the preceding seasons for the corresponding weeks. Other New England points were optimistic regarding the mill situation and stated that no general curtailment was expected. Cables from Liverpool interests had been referred for settlement to legal arbitration with hopeful prospects.

(Special to The Evening Times.) New York, Nov. 23.—Liverpool received many doleful accounts of this morning and declined some 6 points when was greater than expected. This brought some swing at the opening and afterwards from Wall Street, but this was absorbed on a slowly advancing market until at the close the Wall Street sellers had turned buyers. It now looks as if the people were becoming convinced that the financial situation would improve more rapidly than seemed possible a week ago. In cotton the tendency toward smaller crop estimated is creating the impression that the government estimate to be gathered on Monday will confirm this tendency and that when it is published in December it will also be a low one, as a result of the week's transactions. We think Wall Street short interests has been reduced, but that the local trade have taken their place in looking for lower prices. Liverpool should more than recover today's decline on Monday.

That the registration books for the Bond Election held on September 26th, 1907, be revised according to law; that there be two ballot boxes at each precinct, one labeled "Dispensary" and the other labeled "Prohibition"; that the ballot to be used be written or printed on white paper, three inches long by two and one-half inches wide, and without device; that every voter qualified by law to vote in this election, who is in favor of dispensaries shall vote in the ballot-box labeled "Dispensary" a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words "For Dispensary," and every such voter who is opposed to dispensaries, and bar-rooms, and saloons, shall vote in the box labeled "Prohibition" a ballot on which is written or printed the words "For Prohibition"; and that the election be held and conducted by the registrars and judges of election in accordance with the provisions of the law regulating municipal elections.

The Metal Market. (By Leased Wire to The Times.) Boston, Nov. 23.—Opening: North Butte, 36 1/2; Smelting, 34 1/2; Butte, 33 1/2; Utah Mining, 32; New Haven, 13 1/2; Smelting, 6 1/2. Market irregular. In the manufacture of tinfoil a pipe is made of pure tin, and this is filled with lead. The whole is then beaten out in the same manner as gold leaf is beaten, the tin coating spreading with the lead core. The three sheets are sometimes reduced to a thickness of .001 of an inch.
