EDISON GIVES SELF-MURDERED TREASURER A GOOD NAME

Orange, N. J., Feb. 17.—Thomas A. Edison received a Hearst News Service reporter at his West Orange works today. Regarding Randolph's suicide, Mr. Edison said:

"Randolph was the last of the first of my employes, having entered my employ as an office boy at my Menlo Park works thirty years ago. He took such an interest in my affairs that he was rapidly advanced until he was placed in the position of treasurer of the National Phonograph Company, Edison Storage Battery Company, Edison Manufacturing Company and the Edison Portland Cement Company. As far as Mr. Randolph's financial accounts are concerned, I will state positively that his finances are all right. His principal duties were to sign checks for the above firms. I know of no reason for Mr. Randolph taking his life. I think he was temporarily insane. He had a brother to die in an insane asylum at Trenton two years ago, and it looks as if he had inherited insanity. The report that Randolph's mind became unbalanced by overwork is not so."
