Chicago, Ills., March 11.—H. J. Handy, swimming unattached, won the four central A. W. U. champion-

ships contested for yesterday afternoon and evening in the tank of the Chicago Athletic Association. Handy made a clean sweep of the card, winning the 440 yard, 220 yard breast, half mile and mile events. He was not pushed out in any of the races.

The Ocean Yacht Races.  
New York, March 11.—Conditions governing the ocean race to be run under the auspices of the Brooklyn Yacht Club for sailing craft for the \$1,000 cup presented by Sir Thomas Lipton, have been announced by the club. The race is open to sailing yachts measuring not more than 100 feet extreme length, any rig belonging to any organized yacht club in the world and will start at 10 a. m., July 4.

Boats to enter must be bona fide racing craft, having full decks, water tight cockpit and of substantial construction and rig. Yachts having fin or bulb keels, or balanced rudders, are barred.

Entries must be received by the committee not later than June 15 and must be accompanied by a measurement certificate.

New York Athletic Club Games.

New York, March 11.—Three world's records, two for running and

one for weight throwing, were smashed in the games of the New York Athletic Club last night. Forrest C. Smithson, the crack Oregon hurdler, lowered one mark, the twenty-third regiment relay team did the second trick, and Matt McGrath, the giant weight thrower, made the third.

Smithson, of the New York Athletic Club, lowered the world's mark in the third heat of the 70-yard hurdle race to 8 4-5 seconds, two-fifths of a second faster than the mark made by Schase in 1894.

Melvin Sheppard proved an easy winner in the 1,000-yard invitation event. Sheppard got the lead at the start, increased it along the entire route and won by more than fifty yards.

Some Warm Maids.  
Chicago, March 11.—Jimmy Callahan, proprietor of the Logan Square semi-professional baseball, says he has written Ty Cobb and shown the latter where he can make \$5,000 by playing with his club during the season of 1908. He fully expects the Georgia wonder to accept his proposition, and says he has nothing to fear from the National commission as he has not signed a Detroit contract, and if he does not play with the Tigers next summer he is not likely to be heavily penalized should he desire to return.

An Old Timer With Fat Wallet.  
New York, March 11.—Tex Rickard, who pulled off the Game-Nelson fight at Goldfield in 1906, is on deck again with an offer of a \$35,000 purse for Jim Jeffries—win, lose or draw—if he will consent to fight Jack Johnson to a finish at Rawhide, Nev., on Labor Day.

Rickard has sent an agent to Jeff, who is at Los Angeles, to get his consent. But sporting men believe that Jeffries will stick to his determination to remain out of the ring.

### A. AND M. CADETS JOIN THE PEACE SOCIETY.

About 350 young soldiers of the A. and M. College, after listening to an address by Mr. Hayne Davis last evening, joined the North Carolina Peace Society, the division being known as the A. and M. Branch. The presidents elected were: For the seniors, J. S. Stroud; for juniors, J. O. Sadler; for sophomores, J. W. Sexton; for freshmen, W. M. Lambeth. Dr. George T. Winston was elected honorary president of the branch. This branch will take steps to be represented at the peace conference.

The funeral of the late Thomas L. Darnell was held from the residence, 503 East Jinea street, at 10 o'clock this morning.

The services were conducted by Rev. L. McK. Pittenger, assisted by Rev. Milca Barber. The interment was in Oakwood cemetery. The floral tribute was large and beautiful, coming from a host of friends, showing the high regard in which Mr. Darnell was held by all who knew him.

## CHAMBER OPPOSES IT

### Does not Want the Shoo-fly Discontinued

Mr. Hayne Davis in Interest of Peace Conference—May Get Power From Buckhorn—For North Carolina Summer School—Other Matters.

The Chamber of Commerce at its meeting last night adopted a resolution appointing a committee of five to appear before the Corporation Commission and urge that the local train operating between Raleigh and Weldon be maintained and to take such steps as may be necessary to insure its continuance. The committee is composed of T. H. Briggs, chairman; F. W. Habel, F. W. Mahler, T. P. Jerman and T. W. Dobbin. The chamber will resist vigorously with the Merchants' Association the discontinuance of the Shoo-fly.

Col. Johnson, president of the chamber, called attention to the opportunity the city has of securing power from Buckhorn Falls. The matter was received favorably and the president will appoint a committee to take the matter in hand.

Col. Fred A. Olds, secretary, was authorized to request the city to install in the city hall a clock that will keep time and that it be electrically illuminated.

Rev. Geo. W. Lay, rector of St. Mary's School, addressed the chamber in the interest of a Y. M. C. A. for Raleigh, as did also Col. Olds and Mr. Busbee. No action was taken.

Mr. Hayne Davis, president of the North Carolina Peace Society, addressed the body on the subject of the approaching North Carolina congress. The resolution adopted by the Wilmington chamber was read and endorsed and the president was instructed to appoint delegates to the congress.

The report of the secretary showed that the money stringency had not affected local improvements.

State Superintendent Joyner and Mr. C. J. Parker will go to Washington in a few days to confer with the secretary of the Peabody fund relative to securing an appropriation for the North Carolina Summer School to be held at the A. & M. College next summer. Both the governor and the president of the college have endorsed the movement.

A survey has been made for a timber road between Raleigh and Spring Hope and when the road is completed the Atlantic Coast Line will operate passenger trains on it.

Work will soon be commenced on two new hospitals for Raleigh, the one to take the place of Rex Hospital and the other to be erected near the Catholic Orphanage.
