Low Rates and Mileage Books via Seaboard, Commencing April 1.

On April 1 the Seaboard Air Line Railway will put on sale intra-state rates in the state of North Carolina at rate of 2 1/2 cents per mile, and as soon thereafter as possible will issue tariffs showing interstate rates to all points south of the Ohio and Potomac rivers on basis of 2 1/2 cents per mile, it being understood, however, that the R. F. & P. will continue to use \$3.50 rate between Richmond, Va., and Washington, D. C.

Two thousand mile books, interstate and interchangeable, will be sold for \$40.000, good for five or less people, members of a firm or corporation, only one person being allowed to use it at a time.

THE HAYTIEN SITUATION; ON FRIDAY DEPENDS

Port au Prince, March 19.—Consequent upon the decision of the Haytien government to permit the participants in the late insurrection, who have found asylum in the various consulates, to leave the country unmolested, the French cruiser D'Estrees is preparing to take on board all the refugees in the French, German and Spanish consulates at Gonaives, St. Marc and Port au Paix. The cruiser will take the revolutionists to St. Thomas.

President Nord Alexis has issued instructions in the case of six military officers, including Major Larague, commandant of the crack cavalry corps, who are now under arrest on suspicion of being implicated in the recent conspiracy, that, if the facts warrant it, they be taken before a regularly constituted military court for examination.

On Friday next a court martial will decide the case of Major Aurel Madou, charged with making an attempt against the security of the state and conspiracy to assassinate the president. There were no signs of disturbances throughout the city today, the presence of the warships in the harbor allaying the fear of the foreign residents.

UNITED MINE WORKERS ACT ON WAGE REPORT

The Oriental Bank is Solvent.

(By Leased Wire to The Times)

Indianapolis, Ind., Mar. 19.—The United Mine-Workers' Convention met this morning to act on the report of the national wage committee which recommended late yesterday that separate district conferences be asked for between the miners' associations in the central competitive district and the various operators' associations. The committee recommended that separate wage conferences be held in the districts of the southwest district; that the scale adopted in each instance be not less than the present existing scale and that in case of failure to complete negotiations a suspension of work be called until contracts extending beyond April 1st be signed.

The miners have already received the acceptance of the Indiana operators of the invitation.

Through the efforts of Mayor Bookwalter and the Central Labor Union the convention reconsidered its vote of February 29th to hold the next annual convention in St. Louis, and after much balloting decided to return to Indianapolis in 1909.
