Vassie Salmon and Rosa Johnson, Escaped From Roads, Again in Toils

Two women convicts who escaped from the county workhouse recently, Rosa Johnson and Vassie Salmon, were captured Tuesday night in a box car near the Mills' Manufacturing Company plant, at the lower end of Fayetteville street, by Policeman J. W. Peebles. With them were found two young white men. Rosa Johnson is the white woman who was tried for murdering her infant a few months ago, and was sent to the work house for twelve months.

New York, April 30.—"Divorce is a point which the Catholic church can never yield. Its position in this is a safeguard to the republic," declared Cardinal Logue, primate of all Ireland, during an address to the Catholic lady of New York in Carnegie Music hall, in which he dwelt strongly on the dangers of the growing looseness of the marriage ties.

Before thousands of the members of the Church of St. Peter at the first meeting of the celebration of the anniversary of the centenary of the prince of the church declared his views on divorce.

Thousands of laymen and their families were present at the meeting, which filled the hall from orchestra to gallery. Judge Morgan O'Brien presided, and there were on the platform the primate of all Ireland, Archbishop Aversa, papal delegate to Cuba, Archbishop Farley and many prominent prelates, priests and laymen.

QUARTER OF MILLION FOR SUFFERERS BY CYCLONE

Washington, April 30.—Further relief for sufferers from the recent cyclone in Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana is provided in a resolution introduced in the house by Representative Bowers, of Mississippi. It directs the secretary of war to procure in the open market or otherwise subsistence and quartermaster's supplies, medicine and medical supplies, in addition to such supplies belonging to the military establishment, and to issue the same to such destitute persons as have been rendered homeless or are in needy circumstances. The sum of \$250,000 is made available for the purpose.

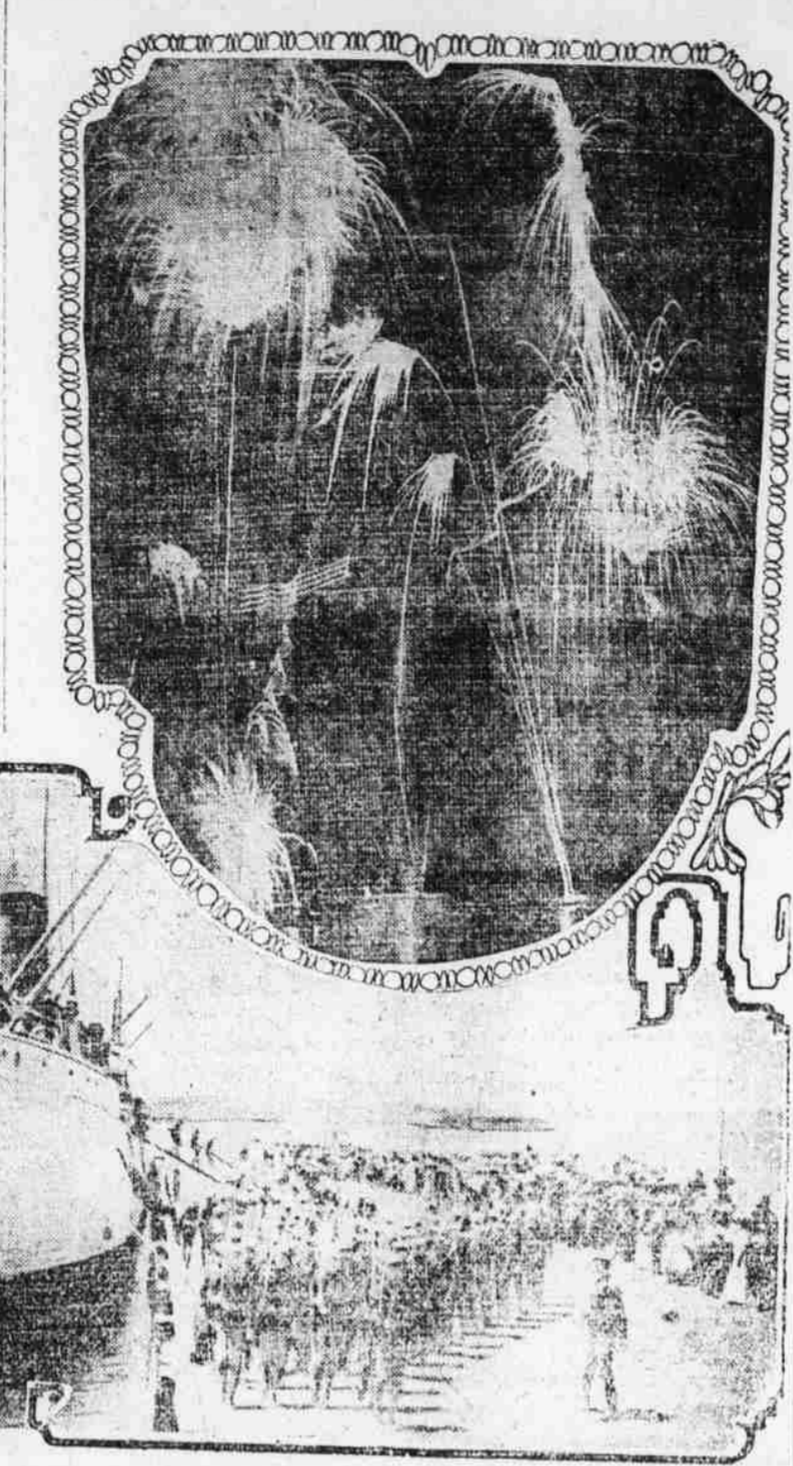

EIGHT HOUR BILL WILL BE GREAT VICTORY FOR LABOR.
