TO RUN CARS ON MARTIN STREET

Trolley Wires Completed Today and Raleigh Will Have Fine System

With nearly 12 miles of trackage and 28 cars the Raleigh Electric Company will start to running cars on the Martin street extension Saturday morning. The trolley wire was strung this morning. The Martin street extension starts at Fayetteville street and goes out Martin street to about 100 yards beyond Tarboro street to the new extension of Pettigrew street, thence turns north and runs to New Bern avenue. The end of the line is very near the Soldiers' Home and will enable the old soldiers and other people living in that section of the city to take advantage of the excellent car system that Raleigh can boast of now. The company has several new cars and the track is the very best street railway track. The cars on the new extension will run from the end at New Bern avenue up to Fayetteville street and transfer the passengers to the other lines from that corner.
