PRISONER BREAKS JAIL.

Charlie Brinson, Charged With Illicit Distilling, Escapes From New Bern Jail.

New Bern, August 7.—Charlie Brinson, a United States prisoner, held on the charge of conducting an illicit still in Pitt county, broke jail here early this morning and is still at large.

Brinson was not put in a cell, and it is believed that a confederate on the outside got an axe to him; with which he pecked a hole in the brick wall large enough to admit his body, then by suspending a blanket from the window got down easily and went away. The jail has been in use only about three months and is equipped with all the necessary iron work to prevent breaking out. It is one of the best and strongest jails in the state. The prisoner was not the principal in the crime, but was held as a witness and accessory.
