VETERAN TALKS. HIS EXPERIENCES

Mayor O. R. Smith of Warren County Who Fought in Three Wars

An interesting visitor in Raleigh yesterday was Major O. R. Smith, of Warren county. Mr. Smith enjoys the distinction of having fought through three wars, and though 82 years old is more active than thousands of men at 60. To use his own expression, he is "as sound as a dollar in tooth, heart, lungs, mind, and still has the world under his feet."

"I am living," said Mr. Smith, "on the same spot that my great grandfather pre-empted during the reign of Charles II."

Mr. Smith was orderly sergeant of Co. H, 1st N. C. regiment, and followed the fortunes of General Zachary Taylor in the Mexican War. He enlisted in 1846.

During the administration of Franklin Pierce, Brigham Young, the Mormon chief, denied the authority of the United States government, and secure, as he thought, in the wilds of Utah, he defied the military authorities.

"Can't you make Brigham Young behave?" the president asked Albert Sidney Johnson, one of the best soldiers that ever lived.

"General Johnson said he could, and we started out from Fort Leavenworth, Kan., for the Mormon settlement in Utah, 1,600 miles away. We were gone two years. There wasn't much war to it. It was what you might call a 'leg war.' Brigham Young gave up as quick as we got there."

After this Mr. Smith retired to private life, and lived in peace until the Civil War broke out.

"I'm the original secessionist," said Mr. Smith, "and I haven't been reconstructed yet. I believe just as much in states' rights as I did before the war. I made the first Confederate flag. I designed the 'Stars and Bars' that we fought under four years. Reconstructed? Huh—not by a d—n sight!"

"And I'm a Tar Heel, young man; every inch of me. Don't you know—the very best type of the white race live in North Carolina, and it's been that way ever since the beginning. Here's how I feel about this old state—if I could take you to my home, I could show you better: At my home I have three flags. On the right is the old Confederate flag, the Stars and Bars. To the left is the Stars and Stripes, and right up above them both is the flag of North Carolina! And that is how it stands with me."

Mr. Smith entered the army a private. He served his country faithfully during the whole of the war and retired a major. He is a fine, interesting old man. May he live many years longer.

It forms the centre of the plot which is as improbable as it is interesting. The improbability of the whole story perhaps only heightens the interest which is sustained from cover to cover. "The Little Brown Jug at Kildare" will be put on the market by the publishers, the Bobbs-Merrill Company, about the last of November and will doubtless prove one of the best sellers of the season. Little brown jugs of Kildare will no doubt be all the go.

Kildare is an imaginary town on the North and South Carolina border, where many exciting events take place. The state house at Raleigh and at Columbia are two chief centers of interest. Other North Carolina towns are mentioned. A charming romance runs through the story woven around the daughters of the two governors and two young men, bosom friends, who unknown to each other, become involved in the affairs of state government, each sustaining the role of governor assisted by the governor's daughter. A delightful love story is the result. The local color is good, the author, Mr. Nicholson, having spent some time in the state before writing his book.

It is attractively bound, the cover bearing a picture of the capital at Raleigh. "The Little Brown Jug at Kildare" promises to be equally, if not more, popular than "The House of a Thousand Candles" and "The Port of Missing Men," two of Mr. Nicholson's books, which were great favorites.
