TYPHOID IN MINERAL WATER.

The State Chemist Finds Typhoid in Thirty-Five Out of Forty-Seven. A bill was reported favorably this morning in the senate which provides for an analysis of all mineral waters offered for sale or for resorts in the state, and if found bad the analysis will be published in the Health Bulletin. It provides also that the owner of a spring may have the water analyzed three times and if found pure it will be so stated in the Health Bulletin.

But here is the most interesting matter of the whole thing under discussion: Dr. Lewis finds that in the 47 mineral waters being sold in this state, 34 are polluted with typhoid germs, and actually dangerous.

Few will read this, comparatively speaking, but it is of vital importance. It goes without saying that the Scott bill will pass both houses.

Just think of people going to a health resort to drink typhoid germs.

Notice of Election for School Taxes in Raleigh Township, MARCH 16, 1909.

Notice is hereby given that pursuant to an act of the General Assembly of North Carolina, passed at the special session of 1908, as amended by an act of the General Assembly of 1909, an election has been called by the Board of County Commissioners, to be held within Raleigh Township, on the 16th day of March, 1909, upon the question of whether there shall be levied in said township a special annual tax of fifteen cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of property and forty-five cents on each poll, such tax to be used for general school purposes in Raleigh Township, and that for the purpose of this election the precincts shall be the same as were established in the general election for State and County offices held in November, 1908, and that polling places are established and registrars appointed for such election as follows:

That the registration books will be opened between the hours of nine o'clock a. m. and sunset on each day from February 12th to March 6th, inclusive, and on each Saturday during this period the registrars will attend with the registration books at the various polling places for registration of voters.

That those in favor of levying and collecting said tax shall vote a ticket on which shall be printed or written the words "For School Taxes", and those who are opposed shall vote a ticket on which shall be printed or written the words "Against School Taxes."

That a new registration is ordered for this election, and that all persons desiring to vote must register anew.
