THE TIMES' DAILY FINANCIAL STORY

(By T. C. SHOTWELL)

New York, April 3.—Stocks with which Edwin Hawley is identified were the only strong features of trading in Wall street today. Interborough-Metropolitan, Alton and Chesapeake and Ohio were the active representatives of the group. Alton closed 72, Chesapeake and Ohio was active around 70, and Interborough-Metropolitan preferred advanced above the closing of yesterday. American Ice was another strong feature. This stock having fallen into the hands of conservative people and having harvested a bountiful crop in Maine, it is expected to make considerable money this summer.

Chicago board of trade as the result of the wheat advance had no effect in New York, where the firm is also a member of the Consolidated Exchange. On the New York curb market the low priced copper stocks were the feature. Nevada Consolidated, Kerr Lake, Nipissing, Latrobe and Giroux were the other strong features.

New York Cotton Letter. (By W. B. Hibbs & Co.) New York, April 3.—The situation and outlook of the cotton market has been improved so much an extent during the week that the tendency has been turned upward. The generalality of traders have professed the belief this has been due chiefly to the drought situation in Texas and have commented on this to such an extent the impression has erroneously been created that the whole state is suffering so much for the want of general soaking rains that the crop in that section is destined to have a late and very poor start. As a matter of fact there has been little or no departure from the normal winter's rains except in the central and southern portion of the state, and as a consequence this situation is being exaggerated. One should remember the enormous territory in Texas and that it produces 25 to 30 per cent. of the crop in a normal season.

As a matter of fact the market turned from its depression early in the week on the development of a much better class of buying and certain leading operators taking in their shorts and doubling up on the long side on the much better prospects for an earlier settlement of the general tariff question than indicated last week and the improvement which is now unquestionably developing as a consequence in general business. This new buying coming on a sold-out and over-sold market in the general option lists here as well as at Liverpool and New Orleans has made the speculative condition much more in favor of the bull side. The advance during the week has extended to 30 points or \$1.50 per bale. As the demand for spot cotton as well as cloths and yarns is improving the situation and outlook is now in favor of higher prices for the general option list. Therefore purchases of July, August, and October are now more advisable, especially on the soft spots.
