OBSERVE PALM SUNDAY

Churches Celebrate the Day Tomorrow

The Saviour's Triumphant Entry Into Jerusalem and Beginning of Holy Week Marked by Use of Palm Branches—Confirmation Services in Churches.

Tomorrow is Palm Sunday, the beginning of Holy Week, and with it the closing days of Lent begin.

During the coming week the commemoration of the great spiritual deliverance of mankind by the sacrifice of the Saviour on the Cross of Calvary is devoutly observed.

Palm Sunday commemorates the eventful hour in the Saviour's earthly career, when He rode in triumph into Jerusalem as told in St. Matthew, 21:8-9:

"And a very great multitude spread their garments in the way; others cut down branches from the trees and spread them in the way."

"And the multitudes that went before and that followed cried, saying: Hosanna to the Son of David; Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord, Hosanna in the highest."

In the Episcopal and Roman Catholic churches the lessons and sermons for each day during Holy Week are based upon the accounts of the trial and condemnation and the sufferings and death of the Saviour given in the four gospels.

All the transcendent events that lead up to the awful tragedy on Calvary are a part of this solemn commemoration.

The culminating observances of these solemnities take place on Good Friday in the services appointed for the day of the Crucifixion.

Good Friday is the great fast of the church in the year, and altars and chancels are draped in most sombre colors. Many churches hold the Three Hours Service during the time of the Saviour's Passion, clergymen giving addresses at intervals on the last seven words that fell from the Master's lips.

At all the Episcopal churches and at the Church of the Sacred Heart a procession of palms will be used to typify the first Palm Sunday in tomorrow's services.

In the Roman Catholic church the

palms will be blessed and distributed to the congregation.

Tomorrow will be a notable day in the Episcopal churches here, as Bishop Cheshire will administer the rite of confirmation at the Church of the Good Shepherd in the morning, at St. Mary's in the afternoon, and at Christ church at night.

A week from Palm Sunday will come the glorious festival of Easter, with its message of joy and life and hope. Magnificent music will be heard on Easter morning in Raleigh churches.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The low pressure area, or storm center over northern Minnesota, yesterday, now over the Lake region, attended by light rains. The southeast storm now lies off the North Carolina coast, and has caused rains in North Carolina and Virginia.
