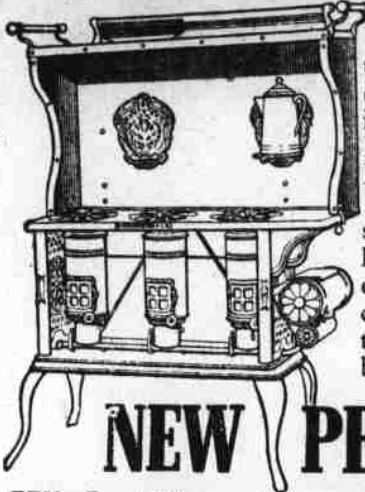

## STATE NEWS.

### THE CHARLOTTE CELEBRATION.

An Immense Reviewing Stand to be Erected For the 20th of May Celebration.

(Special to The Times)

Charlotte, April 13—All committees of the Twentieth of May celebration, which is to be held in this city next month, commemorating the signing of the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence, are rapidly completing their program for the big event. The several parade committees, including the floral, the colonial, and others, are making preparation for the most spectacular affair in the history of the city. The Daughters of the American Revolution, the Children of the Confederacy, the Colonial Dames and other historic organizations will participate in the procession. The chairman of the floral parade committee is anxious that all members of these organizations who do not live in Charlotte shall be present "Taft Day" and take part in the parade.

Definite plans have been made to erect an immense reviewing stand on the Mecklenburg county court house grounds, from which President Taft and his party, including Mrs. Taft and Mrs. Stonewall Jackson, will review the parade.

### Bad Wreck Near Old Fort.

Asheville, April 12—Six passengers and two trainmen were slightly injured when passenger No. 22 turned over near Old Fort at 9:30 yesterday morning. The engine did not leave the rails and dragged the four overturned coaches and tender some distance before it could be stopped.

The cause of the accident seems to be a mystery. The tender was the first to leave the rails and the four coaches followed. An examination of the track after the accident showed it to be in perfect condition.

That all the passengers escaped alive was almost a miracle. As it was the extent in injuries were sprains, bruises and cuts by flying glass, several of a painful, but none of a serious nature.

Doctors were sent out from Asheville and Old Fort and the injured were carried to a near-by house, where their wounds were dressed. A derrick and wrecking crew was sent out and by 3:45 the track was clear.

Conductor Murphy was in charge of the train that was wrecked near Murrinstown, Tenn., some years ago, killing 67. Flagman Shoaf was in the famous Boston bridge wreck at Statesville, when 18 firemen returning from the state convention, were killed.

### Asheville Shooting Affair.

(Special to The Times)

Asheville, April 12—Apparently because he was vexed at being asked for his hack fare, John Burchfield shot and killed Zeke Roberts at his home on Magnolia avenue, shortly before midnight Saturday. Roberts lingered until 4:00 o'clock Sunday morning.

According to witnesses the shooting was without provocation. Roberts, whose father owns a large number of street hacks in the city, was sitting in one of these hacks with Earle Rambo, when John Burchfield came up and asked to be driven home. On reaching his home Burchfield started into his house without offering to pay his fare, 50 cents. Roberts reminded him of it, whereupon Burchfield told him he was not going to pay it. Roberts insisted and Burchfield drew his pistol, a .44 calibre, and shot him in the temple.

When found in bed at his home a few minutes later Burchfield appeared to have no realization of what he had done. He was apparently in the last stage of drunkenness. When asked about his deed, he said, "Yes, I shot him right up here" pointing to his forehead. "I expect he's dead about now."

### GOVERNOR GRANTS FOUR PARDONS

The governor has granted pardons to four convicts as follows:

Oliver Redding, convicted of retailing in Iredell county and sentenced to twelve months on the roads. Governor Kitchin says of this defendant: "Prisoner was convicted for selling whiskey contrary to law and sentenced to twelve months on the roads. He has served about eleven months. He has a wife and three little children, with nothing to go on. His wife has rented a piece of land, and wants prisoner out to help her pitch the crop. For these reasons many citizens, including the strongest prohibitionists in Iredell county, ask his pardon. His prison record is good. Pardon is therefore granted prisoner."

Allen Gray, convicted of larceny in Pitt county and given two years on the roads. Of this prisoner the governor says:

"Prisoner was convicted of stealing \$30 in money and sentenced to two years on the roads. He has served nineteen months. Considering that some of the jurors state that they had some doubt at the trial, and more doubt now, of his guilt, I share the opinion of the solicitor that he has been sufficiently punished. The judge and many citizens of Pitt county also recommend the pardon. Pardon granted."

William Lowder, guilty of retailing and sentenced to six months in each of three cases, from Burke county. The governor says:

"Prisoner was convicted of selling whiskey unlawfully in three cases and sentenced to jail for eighteen months—six months in each case. He has served thirteen months. Many citizens, including officials and strong temperance advocates, stated that he has been punished sufficiently. Owing to his otherwise good character, and to the destitute condition of his wife and children, and to the punishment he has endured, a pardon is granted, conditional upon his good behavior. The prisoner is a cripple."

Colon Davis, found guilty of receiving stolen goods, Buncombe county. The governor's statement about this pardon is as follows:

"Colon Davis was convicted of receiving stolen goods and sentenced to one year on the public roads at the August, 1908, term of Buncombe criminal court. The reasons for his pardon are: 'In this case the owner of the property in asking for prisoner's pardon states that prisoner, a seventeen-year-old boy, was inveigled, in her opinion, into taking the stolen goods by his co-defendant. Pardons were refused in case of the application of John Pate, of Madison county, serving a twelve year sentence for murder in the second degree, and Sidney Norris, of Harnett, serving a like sentence.

### RED MEN DISTRICT CONVENTION

Held Yesterday and Last Night at Henderson.

Tell it not to an Oconeechee Red Man that the Mohawks of Henderson hunting grounds do not know how to welcome a brother and make glad his heart.

Fourteen chiefs of the Oconeechee of these hunting grounds trailed into the forest of the Mohawks yesterday evening as delegates to the District Red Men's Convention, consisting of Great Sachem Jos. E. Pogue, Harry R. Roberts, W. F. Nelts, H. A. E. Olmstead, M. F. Ruth, W. W. Willis, H. H. Roberts, M. H. Rigan, C. H. King, W. H. Bunn, E. G. Ephurch, C. W. York, J. B. Lloyd, and W. F. Draper.

Much work was done in advancing Redmanship in this, the fifth district. The day was fittingly appropriate, as by legislative enactment it is a legal holiday, commemorative of that patriotic action taken at Halifax court house 131 years ago resulting in American independence.

Particularly fitting to the occasion and of deep interest to the Order of Red Men is the fact that the resolutions adopted at Halifax Court House was written by Cornelius Harnett, who was then the first Sachem of the Son's of Famina, appointed for the colony of North Carolina.

Judge H. B. Roberts, who is a most enthusiastic Red Man, introduced a resolution which was unanimously adopted petitioning the great council of North Carolina to make April 12 a "memorial day" among the North Carolina Red Men, to be known as "Cornelius Harnett Day", to be observed by public exercises commemorative of that illustrious citizen, patriot hero and determined colonist, whose acts and words gave to the colonists that faith and determination which ripened into hope and culminated in blazing sunshine of American independence.

Sannap—C. W. York, Oconeechee Tribe, Raleigh.

Guard of Wigwam—B. F. Payne, Mohawk Tribe, Henderson.

Guard of Fires—M. H. Falson, Roanoke Tribe, Roanoke Rapids.

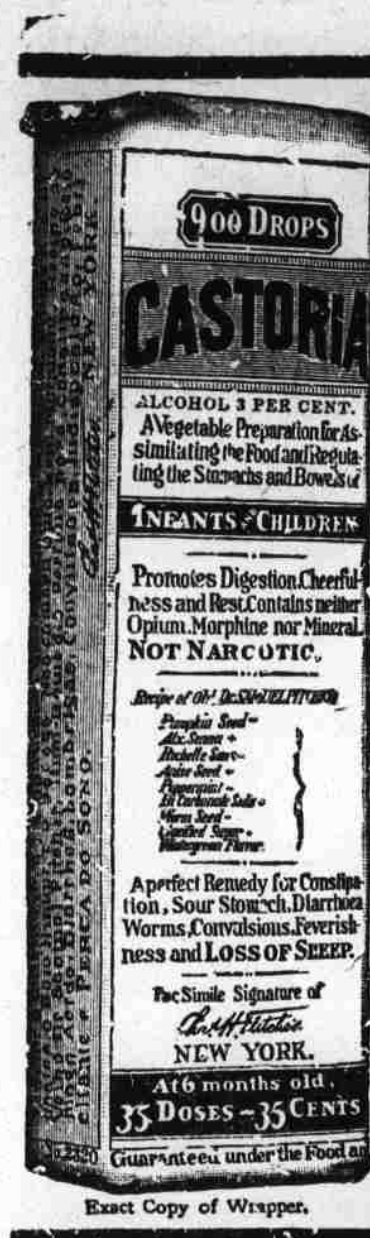
The next session of the district council will kindle its council fire with Oconeechee Tribe, at Raleigh.
