Result of Municipal Election—School Closing—New Methodist Church. (Special to The Times.)

Thomasville, N. C., May 5.—The closing exercises of the Thomasville graded school will be held on Thursday and Friday of this week. On Thursday evening Rev. Pato Durham, of Concord, will deliver an address and on Friday evening an opera, "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" will be given by the school. The public is invited to all the exercises.

Monday night, for the first time, all the merchants of the town as per agreement, closed their places of business at 7:30 and promptly at that time all places were dark. By this arrangement all will have shorter hours for transacting business.

Monday the municipal election was held. Everything passed off quietly and the entire ticket named in the primary was elected as follows: For Mayor, W. C. Burgin. He received 261 votes. Town Commissioners: J. C. Green, 221; J. R. Myres, 181; J. W. Lambeth, 179; A. H. Ragan, 235; and H. Rapp, 181. This ticket is composed of good men and they will give the town a good administration all the business interests are represented and each and every one has the material advancement of the town at heart. The people of the town expect great things from this board and they will not be disappointed.

Work on the new Methodist church is nearing completion and no doubt by the first of June it will be ready for use, the benches have been ordered and will be here in a few days.

FOR BETTER HIGHWAYS

International League to Meet Soon.

Great Convention to Held in Richmond, Va., May 14th and 15th—Movement to Combine All Organizations Working for Better Roads.

The following invitation has been received at The Times office from the International League for Highway Improvement:

"You are cordially invited to attend a conference of the National Executive Committee of the International League for Highway Improvement (Incorporated under the laws of Florida at St. Augustine, Feb. 15th, 1909, as the National Association) to be held on May 14th and 15th in the auditorium of the Hotel Jefferson, Richmond, Va.

"Many men of prominence have been invited to attend the conference, among them President Taft and Secretary of Agriculture Wilson. Secretary Wilson has already signified his intention of being with us if possible.

"An entertaining program has been prepared through the courtesy of the highway improvement associations of Richmond and of Virginia.

"A special meeting on organization and plan and scope of the National Executive Committee of the International League will be held on Saturday morning, May 15th, at 11 o'clock.

"The proceedings of May 14th comprehend a general discussion of highway improvement by men who have a thorough knowledge of the subject.

"You are earnestly urged to be present on this occasion."

This organization was formerly known as the National Roads Association. Mr. John A. Stewart, of New York, is president and Mr. Harry L. Brown, of St. Augustine, Fla., is secretary. J. E. Ingraham, also of St. Augustine, is treasurer. The vice-presidents of the organization are Albert Lewis, Bear Creek, Pa.; Eugene Masters, St. Augustine, Fla.; E. L. Leighton, Cleveland, Ohio.

This organization is working to combine all the various movements for improved highways into one compact organization in order to more effectively place the needs of the people before the National Congress.

The question of good roads is a vital one and was so recognized by the leading thinkers and national leaders of the last century. Abraham Lincoln said:

"I am in favor of an internal improvement system, and believe that the poorest and most thinly populated countries would be greatly benefited by the opening of good roads and in the clearing of navigable streams."

Before the day of Lincoln the great John C. Calhoun, in a speech before the house of representatives in 1816, said:

"What can add more to the wealth, strength and political prosperity of our country than cheapness of intercourse? Let us then bind the Republic together with roads."

The movement for better roads is growing every day and will finally result in a greater nation.
