The boy has been but 12 months in this country and had no intention of burning a Bible.

As for the statement made by Mr Upchurch that we are not human and are Turks, that we do not pay taxes and have no religion, that we were forced to leave Norfolk and Rich mond and should be forced to leave here. I want to say this: We have been 12 years in this country, and pay from \$700 to \$900 a year taxes. As to our religion, we try to live it in our homes, and let others do like wise. We are all members of the

Catholic church. I want to ask Mr. Upchurch how many Syrians in this city have been in jail or penitentiary? How many have been drunk on the streets in the 12 years we have been here? How many have been tramping without an occupation? Are there any Syrians who drink up their money, while


