Mr. W. H. Darden, of Greensboro, is stopping at the Yarrowburgh.

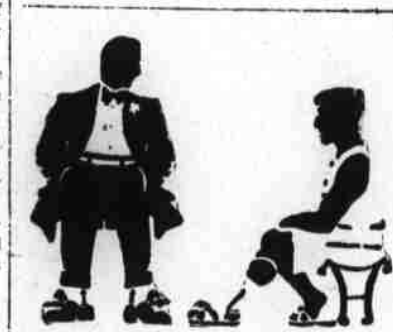
Mr. G. A. Norwood, Jr., of Goldsboro, spent the day in the city.
