New York, June 15.—A report from Washington that the government would investigate the sugar trust more closely and that there was a chance of readjusting the tariff in such a way as to cut down the profits of the trust caused a sharp break in the prices of sugar stock in Wall street today.

The break in sugar incited attacks on other stocks. St. Paul was under pressure as a result of disappointment that the company should require a bond issue after its enormous issues of stock.

Steel shares were heavy throughout the session. Harriman stocks were also freely liquidated. Great Northern Ore certificates were strong but the other Hill stocks were heavy.

Chicago, June 15.—A fine weather map and lower cables caused an easier wheat market, with prices off 1/2 to 3/4 c. There was fair scattered selling by commission houses and local bears with little buying against the downs holding the market.

July wheat was again under pressure of selling orders, coming largely from local commission houses instead of countries where the crop is of such a promising character.
