NEWS FROM KINSTON.

Good Artesian Well—New Rural Route to be Installed.
(Special to The Times)

Kinston, July 16.—Mr. Leslie Turnage, the well-driller, has just secured a good overflow at a depth of 245 feet for the Knott Brothers tobacco warehouse, on Washington street. The well, which is located at the curbing in front of the warehouse, is of good, clear water and runs 20 gallons to the minute. The overflow was secured after about 10 days work. This city unquestionably is blessed in its water. The city water is supplied by four eight-inch overflow wells ranging in depth from 250 to 400 feet. About the city are several such wells for use of the public and many individuals have had overflow wells drilled for private use.

About the first of September a new rural route will be installed in Lenoir county. The route will run from the Deep Run postoffice and will make a circuit and come east near to the Woodington section. This route will supply a long felt want among the people of that neighborhood, who have suffered considerable inconvenience and delay in receiving their mail.

A rainfall of 43 inches yesterday afternoon relieved the oppressive heat and cleared up the atmosphere considerably. The thermometer had reached a maximum of 95.5 degrees when the storm came up and in an hour and a half dropped to 76, reaching a minimum of 55 last night.

Besides the regular routine business, they instructed the superintendent to call a meeting of the full board to be held on Wednesday, August 11th, at 10 o'clock, for the purpose of electing another assistant physician, and for the transaction of such other business as may come before the board. It was the opinion of the committee that the salary of the new assistant physician would be small at first, to be increased from time to time, according to the proficiency of the man. All applicants are requested to make their applications to the superintendent.

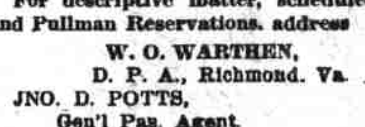
