ENTRIES ARE DOUBLED

Exhibitors Occupying Double the Space of Last Year

One Man Eaters Fifty Head of Live Stock—Eighty-four Head Entered in One Day—Poultry Exhibit a Show in Itself—Ferrals's Great Trained Animal Show.

The prospects for the greatest fair in the history of the state continue to grow brighter every day. The space is rapidly being taken up and when the gates are opened next week every inch of available space will be occupied.

The indications are that the live stock exhibit will far surpass that of other years. There is one entry of fifty head, another of ten, and one of twelve head of cattle and twelve swine, all these entries being in one day, which shows how fast they are coming in.

The poultry exhibit will be almost a show within itself, all the noted strains of chickens, ducks, geese, turkeys, pigeons, etc., as well as many rare and wonderful specimens.

The flower show will be a bower of beauty, a bewildering display of fragrant flowers; odd specimens of nature; a great variety of beautiful flowers including all nature adorns herself, will make a scene that all flower-lovers will delight in.

One of the features of Midway will be Ferrals's trained animal show. This show has excited favorable comment wherever it has been. There are five complete acts to every performance. In one of the acts Carolina performs with a collection of leopards, pumas and several of the finest specimens of lions in the world. In Ricardo's act will be seen one of the rarest and most valuable animals in existence, a cross of leopard and tiger. Another feature is a giant Russian bear, perhaps the largest ever exhibited by any show, which does a number of difficult tricks and seems to understand everything said to him. R. H. BATTLE RE-ELECTED. BANQUET TO-NIGHT

President of Raleigh Good Government Association

A General Review of the Work of the Good Government Association From Its Beginning to Present Time — Officers Elected — Next Meeting in December.

The annual meeting of the Raleigh Good Government Association was held last night in the rooms of the chamber of commerce.

The meeting was called to order by President R. H. Battle. In his address Mr. Battle reviewed the work of the association from its beginning down to the present time. The speaker then related the history of the movement, how it went before the legislature and the treatment it received at the hands of the Wake county representatives, particularly in the senate, and after the request for the commission was refused the advocates decided to appeal to the citizens of Raleigh through a mass-meeting, and after a hard campaign in which some of the best citizens of Raleigh took part, the movement won. There have been requests for a reduction in taxes, but this is impossible now, on account of the financial condition of the city. The bonded indebtedness is \$342,500. \$100,000 of this bearing 4 per cent. interest and the balance 5 per cent., besides a debt of \$18,000 left by the old administration. Under the charter the annual salary list is over \$30,000. Besides this the city must raise \$16,000 interest annually on the bonded debt. The necessary expenses are about \$104,000, while the receipts are \$106,000, which leaves only about \$2,000 to reduce this indebtedness. He said the new administration had made improvements along all lines, and as soon as the debt was paid and the interest provided for without bonds, the taxes would be reduced.

A resolution introduced by Mr. N. B. Broughton endorsing the present administration and expressing the confidence of the association in it, was unanimously adopted.

Mr. W. N. Jones, in the course of some remarks upon the opportunities of the association, advocated a "town meeting" in order to get an expression from all the citizens.

Mr. J. L. O'Quinn said that the movement should include the county.

Mr. J. W. Bailey moved that a committee be appointed to inquire into the different departments and to make suggestions as to the best manner to get the city finances in good condition, which was adopted. The chair appointed on that committee Walter Clark, Jr., George Hunter, James J. Towler, C. J. Hunter, J. G. Ball, and N. B. Broughton.

After the election of the following officers the meeting adjourned to meet the second Monday in December: President, R. H. Battle; vice-presidents, Leo. D. Hart, George Hunter, Carey J. Hunter, N. B. Broughton, Ivan Proctor, Josephus Daniels, E. L. Harris, and W. N. Jones.

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE

An Important Meeting to be Held this Evening

Regular Monthly Meeting This Evening at 8 o'clock—Arrangements to be Made For the Great Farmers' National Congress, Which Meets Here November 3—Other Business.

This evening at 8 o'clock the regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce will be held at its rooms and matters of much importance to the city are to be considered, chief among these being the arrangements of the meeting of the Farmers' National Congress here, which begins Nov. 3rd. A great deal is to be done, committees are to be appointed and various lines of the work to be handled. Funds are to be raised, as Raleigh has pledged itself to put up \$500, which is always placed in the hands of the executive board of the Congress by the city where a meeting is held. A thorough canvass of Raleigh is to be made for the fund. People from practically every state in the Union will be here and letters containing requests for quarters are now coming from trains in the far northwest. Special trains will bring delegates from Chicago, St. Louis, Memphis and other points. Raleigh has been very extensively advertised by the Congress. Quarters have been secured at the Yarbrough House and Park Hotel for the delegates, and the Yarbrough will be headquarters. Of course the city will be canvassed so that other delegates can be placed in boarding-houses and in private homes.

From a business point of view this Congress means much to Raleigh and to North Carolina, and a fine opportunity is afforded Raleigh to show its public spirit and its hospitality. The state is making special preparations for this great meeting, the most important one of farmers ever held in North Carolina. All the delegates should be made at home here. Naturally much money will be expended here by them while in the city, not only for board and lodging but in other ways, and a fine impression of Raleigh may bring about investments here and new settlers also. The Chamber of Commerce secured the holding of this meeting here and naturally expects the community to stand by it in the matter. At the meeting this evening there will be a report on the matter of establishing a dyeing and finishing plant for hosiery here, and other matters will be discussed.
