New York Cotton Letter. (By W. B. Hibbs & Co.) New York, Jan. 10.—The market was extremely feverish and uncertain from the opening today. The census bureau official report showing only 9,616,000 bales ginned to January 1 is extremely bullish, as it confirms in effect the extremely low crop estimate of 10,988,000 put out a month ago by the agricultural bureau. The market opened strong and active on this despite Liverpool's failure to respond to our sharp advance of Saturday. There was a rise of 12 to 17 points from Saturday's close, during the initial trading, January going up to 15.72, March 16.02, and May and July to 16.19 and August to 15.82.

Reports of excessive margin calls of \$10 per bale on new business by some of the leading bull houses was also a heavy perplexing feature. It unsettled the market to such an extent that there was no really good buying until after May and July had slumped to 15.66 and March and January to 15.49 and 15.45. Even the rallies were only moderate and trade continued in a nervous and uncertain position up to the close.

AUTOIST GETS FINED. Mr. Walter Sprunt of Wilmington Fined For Running Down Bicyclist. (Special to The Times.) Wilmington, N. C., Jan. 10.—In Pender county superior court yesterday afternoon, a verdict was rendered against Mr. Walter Sprunt, a well known young business man and prominent autoist of Wilmington, in favor of Mr. Hanson Fitch, of Burgaw. The suit for damages resulted from a collision which occurred about two years ago in this city, as a result of which the plaintiff was knocked from his bicycle by Mr. Sprunt's automobile. The jury brought in a verdict for \$400, the plaintiff having brought suit for \$2,500, alleging permanent and serious injuries as a result of the accident. Two Wilmington physicians, Drs. Robert Harlee and Russell Bellamy, were introduced as expert witnesses and the case was hard fought. This action is interesting, as it is one of the few automobile accident recoveries which have yet been granted by the courts of the state.
