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DIED IN PITTSBURG.

Remains of Mrs. Susan Rayner McMillin Interred in City Cemetery This Morning.

The remains of Mrs. Susan Rayner McMillin, the wife of Claude L. McMillin of Pittsburgh, Pa., were interred in the Cook family burying plot in the city cemetery this morning at 10:30 o'clock.

Mrs. McMillin, who was a daughter of the late Hon. Kenneth Rayner, of this city, died in Pittsburgh, Pa., March 2, where her funeral service was conducted. The remains reached Raleigh yesterday afternoon and were placed in the parlors of the Brown Undertaking Company until this morning, when they were interred in the City Cemetery, the service being conducted by Rev. M. A. Barber, rector of Christ church.

The remains were brought to Raleigh by her husband and two sons by a former marriage, Messrs. Arthur W. and Kenneth R. Gleason, of Washington City.

Mrs. McMillin was a native of Raleigh, her mother, being a daughter of Col. William Polk and a sister of Bishop Polk. She was fifty-three years of age.

She recently visited Raleigh for the purpose of making arrangements for the removal of her mother's remains from Texas to Raleigh, but her own death occurred before this could be done.
