## THE INHUMAN CRIME

### Mother Deserts Child and Leaves It to Die

Child Left Under House—B. Y. P. U. Ending—Governor of Virginia Refuses Respite to Bob Armstrong—Death of Mrs. Vickers—Mrs. Geo. Nash Entertains.

(Special to The Times)

Durham, N. C., June 24—A peculiar noise has heard last night under a house on Chapel Hill street and upon investigation a negro child, not over four hours old, was found. The child had been deserted and left to die. The mother of the child is Bessie Tener, a young negro girl, and little more than a child herself. The police took no action in the matter, owing to the extreme youth of the mother, and the baby was taken care of by neighbors. It is well, and doing finely, in spite of the cruel treatment.

With the primaries but one day off there is little excitement here in political circles. With the exception of Mr. S. C. Brawley there are no new candidates in the field, and the old officers will all be re-nominated. The voters seem to be taking little interest in the campaign, and as yet there is absolutely no political talk in the air. All the four candidates for congress from this district have been here in the past month and each seems to be confident of his success. According to the local politicians there will be a small vote polled tomorrow.

#### The Baptist Young People's Union.

Last night's session wound up the meeting of the Baptist Young People's Union here and the delegates are leaving this morning for their homes. A great amount of work was accomplished and much enthusiasm was aroused. The feature of yesterday's session was the address by Mr. Spillman, who is one of the best Sunday school lecturers ever heard here. He took as his subject "The Young Person and His Bible." Giving as reasons why a young person should know his Bible, he said:

"He should know the book as a matter of culture. Culture is the personal appropriation of the best things written by the master minds of the world. The man who essays to know anything about science and leaves out the first sentence in the first chapter of Genesis has missed the very foundation upon which science is built. If you think you should know something about drama read Job and you will get it. It can give Shakespeare's works pointers every day. I am personally fond of poetry and have read most of the English poets, but for real verse turn to the Psalms of David, especially that one which begins 'The Lord is my shepherd'. It is the masterpiece of song. If you care to know something of history and the great historians the Bible is the book for you, for it contains some of the best biographical sketches in existence. If you young men want to read law look up the laws of Moses, the foundation upon which is built our present legal system."

Continuing his address, he said: "You who are standing with your faces toward the future want to use that masterpiece as a text-book, which will give you the best possible training for any line of work which you will be likely to enter."

carefully investigated the Hamilton case four times and respites have been granted him. I cannot feel justified in setting aside the judgment of the courts, which must now be carried out."

#### ELECTROCUTION AT CONCORD.

Electrician Falls on Live Wire and is Killed—Body Sent to Salisbury.

He was standing on a box adjusting some shafting on the overhead, when the box gave way, and catching to prevent falling he caught a live wire, which resulted in instant death. The body was turned over to Bell & Harris, undertakers, and prepared and shipped to Salisbury. He will be buried at Jerusalem, Davie county, Friday or Saturday. Mr. Beninger came here from Colesburg. #### OPPOSED TO ROOSEVELT.

Eugene Zimmerman Says He Would Go to England if Roosevelt Were President.

Toledo, O., June 24—Eugene Zimmerman, former president of the Detroit, Toledo and Ironton and Ann Arbor railroads and father of the Duchess of Manchester announced today that he was bitterly opposed to the renomination of Theodore Roosevelt for the presidency of the United States on any ticket and that in case he was nominated and elected he would be compelled to leave the United States and become a subject of Great Britain. "Roosevelt's election would certainly mean the first step toward a dictatorship and when that happens I will prefer a liberal constitutional monarchy such as England is," says Zimmerman. "Please understand I am a good American citizen and personally would like to see Governor Harmon of Ohio elected president, but if Roosevelt is ever again to rule this country I immediately pack my grip for England and become a citizen of that country."

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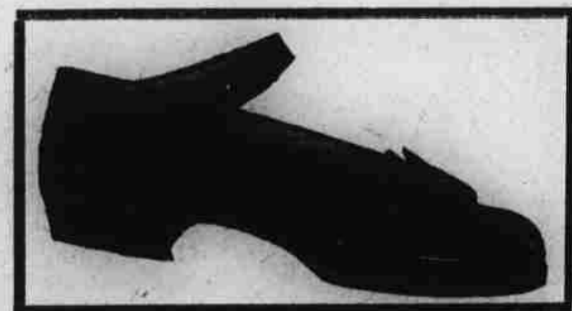
