Durham, N. C., June 24-A has heard last night under a house on Chapel Hill street and upon investigation a ne gro child, not over four hours old, was found. The child had been deserted and left to die. The mother of the child is Bessie Tener, a young negro girl, and little more than a child herself. The police took no action in the matter, owing to the extreme youth of the mother, and the baby was taken care of by neighbors. It is well, and doing finely, in spite of the cruel treatment.

OPPOSED TO ROOSEVELT.

Eugene Zimmerman Says He Would Go to England if Roosevelt Were By S. L. Rotter, B.A., M.A. (Colum-President.

Toledo, O., June 24-Eugene Zimmerman, former president of the Detroit Toledo and Ironton and Ann Arbon railroads and father of the Duchess of Manchester announced today that he was bitterly opposed to the renomina tion of Theodore Roosevelt for the precidency of the United States on any ticket and that in case he was nominat-ed and elected he would be compelled to leave the United States and be-come a subject of Great Britain.

"Roosevelt's election would certainly nean the first step toward a dictator thip and when that happens I will prefer a liberal constitutional monarchy such as England is," says Zimmerman. 'Please understand I am a good American citizen and personally would like to see Governor Harmon of Ohio elected president, but if Roosevelt is ever again to rule this country I immediately pack my grip for England and become a citizen of that country."


