GREAT PITCHERS BATTLE IS WON BY THE SAILORS

Howard and Johnson fought the battle to a finish—both in great form—teams give, tilt-edge support—Keating's work phenomenal—Hobbs played great game at first—Cooper holds down third in big league style—twelve innings of fast ball.

Wilmington took one of the most hotly contested games yesterday ever played on this diamond. Rube Howard was at his best and pitched one of the strongest games he has ever pitched in this league. On the other hand big Johnson was complete master of his game. He kept the slugging Sailors biting and popping up in the air. Only a case of the hardest luck caused the big fellow to lose a hard fought game. For twelve long innings the batters appeared as pigmies before the fast breaking shafts of the two twirlers. It was a case of a pitchers' battle, between two giant slabsmen. Besides the good box work the fielding of both teams was brilliant. Keating appeared faster than ever and got everything that went his way. The grandstand applauded in appreciation of his great work and when he went back of third base and seeped up a fast grounder and got his runner at first, he drew enthusiastic applause. The little fellow is small in size but a perfect giant in his work. He got the only error of his team but it was one of the hardest to get. After Tydeman had singled in the twelfth, Orth sent a line drive at short and in his anxiety to complete a double play, Keating dashed for the ball and fell, the ball bouncing up and hitting his leg and chest. It was a hard chance and an error he could hardly help. Mullaney pulled down one long drive that looked good for extra bases. Hogman hit to deep center in the eighth and tried to stretch it into three bases but Mullaney threw to Keating who quickly threw to Simmons, catching the fleet outfielder by a narrow margin. Hobbs and Mills both played great ball at first. In the third after Hoffman, the swiftest runner on the Wilmington team, had singled, he decided to try McCormick's wing and made a dash for second but the ball was in Bigbie's glove waiting for the slide and he was out. Bigbie, Hobbs and Simmons were all successful in stealing off Hudson's arm. Hobbs went out after Mills' grounder in the seventh and was too far off to run to the bag and had to pull off the Hal Chase stunt of sliding to the bag. It was a piece of quick thinking and he got his runner.

The fatal twelfth came around and Cooper the first up flew to Mullaney, Tydeman singled to right, Orth on to short who fell and Tydeman went to third. Doak hit to Bigbie who threw to the plate too late and Tydeman scored the only run that took the game. Mills and Dubbs were easy outs and as Raleigh could not score in her half the game went to the Sailors.

To show the article of ball Rube was pitching, Mullaney and Hobbs both had chances to break it up in the fourth and sixth innings, but—nothing doing. When these two batters have a chance to break up a game and fail, it is a good sign the opposing pitcher is delivering the goods for they are breaks to any pitcher, and are liable to occur up any game at any time.

As a whole it was one of the best games seen here this season. Cooper did beautiful work at third for Wilmington.

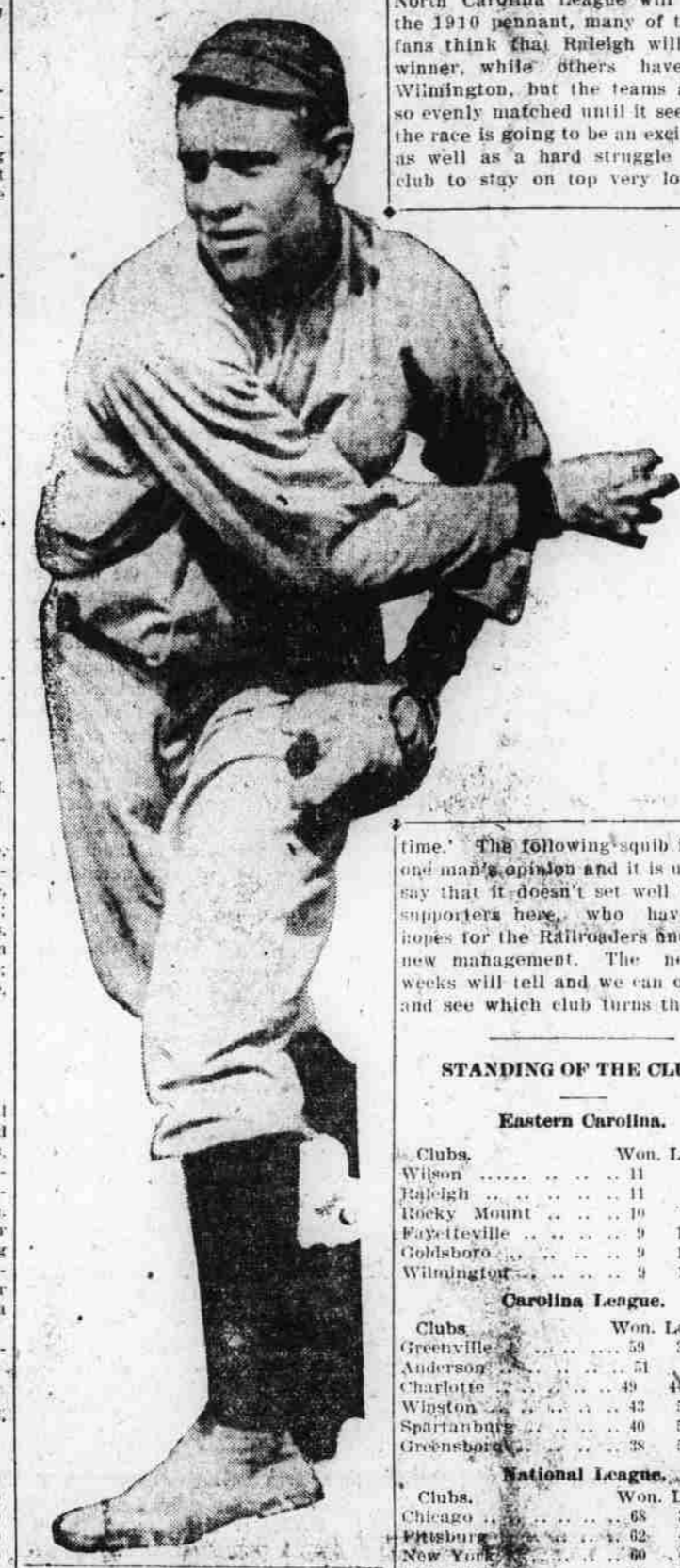
