DEMAND FOR DAMAGES

Damages Demanded of the City For Loss at Person St. Fire

Attorney Robert C. Strong Makes Formal Demand on the City for Damages Resulting From the Fire on Person Street August 8.

Attorney Robert C. Strong today made a formal demand on the City of Raleigh for damages because of the loss of property in the fire on South Person street Monday morning, August 8.

This morning Mr. Strong served the formal demand for damages on the city by handing a copy to Chief of Police Steil. The demand is as follows:

Aug. 18th, 1910. To the Honorable, the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the City of Raleigh:

I hand you herewith, in behalf of my clients, an account against the City of Raleigh for damages incurred by them at a fire at 317 South Person street, Raleigh, about 9 a. m. on Monday, August 8th, 1910; and hereby make demand on the City of Raleigh for its payment.

From information received from persons in position to know, the city has been negligent in keeping in repair the Gamewell Fire Alarm System, and from this negligence damages arose directly to my clients in the amount stated in the attached account.

The Gamewell System of Fire Alarm was adopted and installed by the city some 17 years ago, and covering a period from 1893 to the present time, it had been run down to such a state of inefficiency as to have become, on a number of occasions, useless and worse than useless.

On the date above mentioned the alarm boxes were in such condition as to render them useless in sending in the alarm for the fire. Two companies were told of the fire, and being near, located it by the smoke. Eventually, an alarm was sent in, but it struck 211, and there was no such box, and at least one company prepared to go out but had no idea of the direction, when it erroneously understood by phone that the fire was on North Person street.

At first the impression was that the boxes were being tested, but it was generally thought that the system was in such a bad shape as to be unreliable.

I have heard that it is claimed that the wrong number was struck because another alarm had been sent in on the same line, and therefore the strokes of the bell had been mingled and confused; but under the Gamewell System, an alarm sent from one box will lock all the other calls on the same line, automatically rendering this practically impossible.

Under my reading of the contract between the city and the Water Company, the former has it in its power to force the latter to supply a sufficient pressure, and is responsible if the Water Company fails in its duty to do so.

McKanna Moves Here

Famous Sanitarium Will be Opened Next Wednesday.

Has Secured the Hinsdale Property in Glenwood, Consisting of One Large Building and Three Cottages—Headquarters to be Moved From Reidsville Here.
