RITCHER SHORT IN FUNDS.

Trust Money in His Possession Had Been Spent.

(By Leased Wire to The Times.) Chicago, Sept. 1-That Edward C. Ritcher, who was chief personal counsel for John R. Waish during the years of Walsh's struggle against the governmentn and who died in June. was \$100,000 short in the funds of Beloit College, of which he was custodian was revealed when announcements were made that civil suits would be filed against his estate. Ritcher is said to have been short \$462,000 in all after the Wash case. He originally was shot \$127,000 in college funds. Walsh came to his rescue with \$27,000, leaving the balance at \$100,000 due the college. He gave a note for that amount, which has been held for four years. It was also said that fees belonging to his partners were gone and that Ritcher had lost money in Wall street. The suits are to recover securities he is said to have hypothicated.

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
