TARHEEL HEIRS IGNORED

Robert Potter Leaves Vast Estate to Texans

Lawyers Trying to Locate Relatives of Dead Man on Wild Goose Chase—Valid Will Found—Other Durham News of Interest.

(Special to The Times.)

Durham, N. C., Oct. 13.—Information obtained from a local firm of lawyers puts an end to the excitement incident to the report of the death of Robert Potter, the wealthy North Carolinian, who died in Texas, leaving a vast estate. Ever since the story was published in the papers several weeks ago the office of the register of deeds and other county officials has been deluged with letters from people in various parts of the United States claiming to be the descendants of this man and heirs to his fortune. From the lawyers it was learned yesterday that the will of Mr. Potter has been discovered and that all of the North Carolina heirs have been ignored. The estate consists of 45,000 acres of valuable land, all of which was willed to friends and relatives in Texas.

The will is drawn up in the regular legal form and its validity is unassailable. It seems that the lawyers of the two Carolinas who for the past few weeks have been trying so hard to locate the relatives of this Potter, were all on a wild goose chase, inasmuch as the property has already been disposed of. Mr. Potter left no direct descendants, both of his children having died, and his wife divorced from him by a special act of legislature when he was a member of that body.

The address of the evening was delivered by Dr. Edwin Mims, of the University faculty, well known to Durham men as professor of English in Trinity College for the past fifteen years. No one is better known as a brilliant after dinner speaker than is Trinity's old teacher of inspirational poetry.

San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 13.—"Within two years we will be curing leprosy on a wholesale scale. I am certain a cure has at last been found."

So said Dr. St. David Gynlais Walters, president of the Hawaiian territorial medical society.

"The cure," said the doctor, "is being developed under the commission sent to Hawaii by the federal government to aid the local investigators. This commission consisted of Dr. Brinckerhoff, of Harvard, Dr. Currier and Dr. Holman.

"These men have been working for the last four years along the lines laid down by Moses T. Clegg, of Manila. Taking Mr. Clegg's work as a scientific beginning, the federal commissioners have worked on the serum theory of treatment and they have reached a point where I am certain full success is in sight."
