HIGH PRICES OF BEEF

Should be Placed On the Free List

Beef Trusts Sell its Products Cheaper in London Than it Does at Home

(By CLYDE H. TAVENNER.)

Washington, D. C., Jan. 28.—One of the first things the new democratic house will consider will be the advisability of placing beef on the free list.

The following facts make such action imperative:

1. The packing business in the United States is controlled largely by a trust.

2. The firms in the trust, as well as such alleged independent concerns as Schwartzchild & Sulzberger, have been making profits of from 20 to 45 per cent on their preferred stock for the last several years, while advancing prices every so often by agreement.

3. The legal department of the republican administration has pretended for the last ten years that it has been endeavoring to break up the beef trust, but has utterly failed.

4. The trust is paying the transportation charges on American beef to London, and there selling it for two cents less a pound than in the United States.

5. The beef trust does not regulate its selling prices by buying prices, frequently raising the price of beef to the consumer while paying less to the farmer.

The department of Justice has long taken the position that the beef trust is in existence in violation of the law, yet it has either not desired to dissolve the trust or has been incompetent to do it.

Thousands of poor in the United States are impoverished by the high cost of living. Many cannot afford to eat meat more than once or twice a week.
