

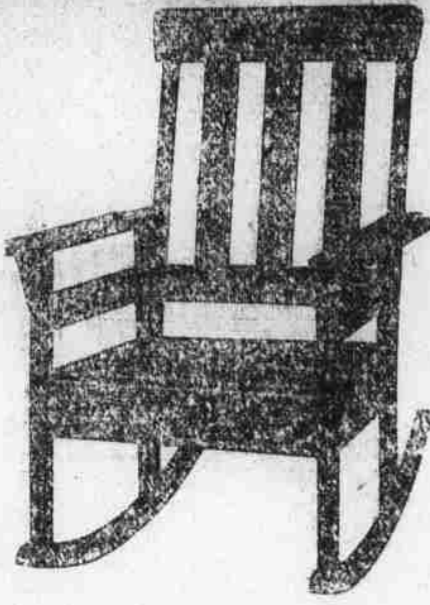

Delivered by Dr. Miller to
Convention Yesterday

Dr. Miller Has Made Profound Impression Upon His Hearers—Delivered Two Stirring Addresses—Mr. M. B. Snier Made Chairman and E. M. Winston of Wake Forest Secretary—Today's Meeting.

The Y. M. C. A. Convention yesterday began by electing Mr. M. B. Snier of Charlotte, chairman, in the absence of Hon. H. B. Erickman, the president of the convention, and Mr. E. M. Winston of Wake Forest secretary. The chairman appointed the following committees:

Dr. Miller's address on "Three Names—His Names" was another of the kind which have made his name so prominent. He took the three leaders of King David who went through the lines of the enemy to get water for their leader. Their act of heroism was not one of mere bravery, but of love and devotion to their leader. He then urged the young men not to get merely from the desire to obey command, but because of their love for the Lord.

In the afternoon session, the devotional exercises were conducted by Secretary A. C. Huntington. Dr. Miller concluded his series of addresses by giving as some thought, the best he had. It was thrilling, heart-lifting and soul-stirring. His theme was "The Lord's Need." He received the Master's life upon earth, the treatment he received at the hands of men and then contrasted it with the treatment he would receive were he on earth today, walking among men. He declared that none of us would today see the Christ going around in need, we would even share our last meal with Him, or give our bed to Him. He went on to show how that today Christianity is imitating Him in carrying on the work that is left for us to do. Dr. Miller has made a profound impression upon all who have heard him, as a masterly speaker and consecrated divine. "He is one of the most earnest speakers that ever appeared in Raleigh."

This morning's session began at 9:20 o'clock with a song service, after which Mr. S. A. Akeley, of Richmond, delivered a strong talk on "A Progressive State Work Policy." The general discussion following was brim full of enthusiasm.

Other short talks were made by Mr. H. O. Williams, of New York, on "The Association in Co-operation" and Mr. C. C. Robinson, of Charlotte, on "The Association's Opportunity With Boys."

During the business session a collection was taken with the following results:

These contributions were entirely voluntary and under the head of colleges, the amount pledged does not represent the colleges that have no representatives at the convention. Among the city organizations, the Charlotte Y. M. C. A. took the lead.

The Interstate Committee recommended that \$2,500 be raised to carry on the expenses of the coming year, also that \$1,500 be raised to cover the deficit of last year. A committee of four was appointed, two from each state, to secure an endowment for the work of the Interstate Committee.
