New York Stock Market. (By Charles W. Storm.) New York, April 20—Devoid of a semblance of activity the market in Wall street today ruled exceedingly dull with the majority of stocks quoting fractional declines under the closing of yesterday.

New York Cotton. (By Eased Wire to The Times.) New York, April 20—Market was the feature of the cotton market at the opening today, showing a 10 point gain. The opening was steady with prices ranging from 3 to 10 points upward.

(Continued From Page One.) actual expenses of the trustees while attending meetings.

The proposed highway will extend from some point on Beaufort harbor, in the county of Carteret, through the counties of Craven, Craven, Jones, Lenoir, Wayne, Johnson, Wake, Durham, Orange, Alamance, Guilford, Davidson, Rowan, Iredell, Catawba, Burke, McDowell, Buncombe, and Madison, to some point on the Tennessee state line.

Chairman Varner, in a few words of appreciation, asked the trustees to stand with him in this undertaking. The expense will be great and united effort will be required to accomplish this road. The length of the highway is 160 miles through all kinds of soil, and under all sorts of conditions.

Interest in Alamance. Mr. S. H. Webb, of Alamance, spoke of the interest in his county. Mr. Webb said that there was a little patch of bad road in his county of 3 1/2 miles, but that can be repaired. Unless the Chapel Hill road is chosen, however, Alamance would be put to more expense.

Heavy forces of United States regulars under command of Colonel A. C. Sharpe and Colonel E. Z. Steever were ordered along the American side of the international line to keep pedestrians and traffic from the exposed zone.

Refugees from Juarez, carrying their household effects began to stream across the international bridges shortly after daybreak. The possibility of bloodshed on the American side of the Rio Grande with resultant international entanglements grew stronger and the controllers brought further information relative to the rebel plan of attack.

When shown the published reports of the reply Mexican Ambassador Zamacona said: "The note addressed by the department of foreign affairs to Ambassador Wilson refers to the lamentable events on the border. It certainly must be friendly in form and essence, for it is impossible to suppose for a moment that it might be in the least unfriendly or discourteous. The relations between the two governments have been most cordial. It would be very convenient to wait until the note is made known in full before venturing any comment on fragmentary and unauthenticated matters."

El Paso, April 20—General Navarro, the Mexican Federal commander at Juarez, replied to the rebels' demand for surrender of that town to day by extending his line of entrenchments farther from the city. Three hundred men were sent out at 3 a. m. to man the trenches and prepare for repelling an assault. Five o'clock this afternoon is the time set by the rebels for the attack on the city unless it is surrendered. No battle is expected before that time.

Every available housepot in El Paso was filled with spectators at dawn, watching the preparations across the Rio Grande. American troops are ready to act and this afternoon bridges into this city and Juarez are guarded. No vehicles are allowed to cross and only pedestrians who can show that they have necessary business to attend to are allowed to pass back and forth.
