STRENGTH IN STOCKS.

Highest Level of the Year in a Number of Stocks.

New York, June 2—Pronounced strength was shown in the opening transactions in stocks with especial activity in the steel group and the Hill stocks.

Advances in the first hour ran between one and two points in many of the principal stocks.

A number of stocks were carried to the highest level of the year this morning in an upward movement which embraced all the important issues and which was characterized by unusual vigor.

The government's cotton report furnished more ammunition for the bulls and was directly reflected in the southern group of stocks.

Certain stocks responded to independent movements but the bulk of the list scarcely moved in the latter part of the day.

INCREASE SHOWN IN THE COTTON ACREAGE

(By Associated Press.)

Washington, D. C., June 2—The department of agriculture's first cotton report of the season shows the area planted to be 35,004,000 acres; increase 4.7 per cent or 1,586,000 acres, compared with 33,418,000 acres revised estimate of last year's area.

The condition of the crop on May 25th was 87.8 per cent, of normal, compared with 80.2 last year and 80.9 ten years average.

FOR MEDICAL CONFERENCE.

Surgeon General Battle in Conference With General Leister—Vaccination of Soldiers Main Topic.

Asheville, N. C., June 2—Surgeon General S. Westray battle left this morning for a conference with the adjutant general at Raleigh.

It is the purpose of the surgeon general to get the sanitary troops of the state in close touch with the medical department of the national government.

The report on the condition of the crop was 87.8 or almost three points higher than the average expected. The ring was crowded twenty deep with brokers, the floor filled with visitors from all parts of the cotton belt.

BUTT GOES FREE.

Former Cashier of Defunct Bank Acquitted of Larceny Charge.

Norfolk, Va., June 2—A. B. Butt, former cashier to the defunct People's Bank, whose speculations exceeded half a million, will, after serving three years, go free.
