MR. JOHN W. CLARK IS ILL WITH APPENDICITIS.

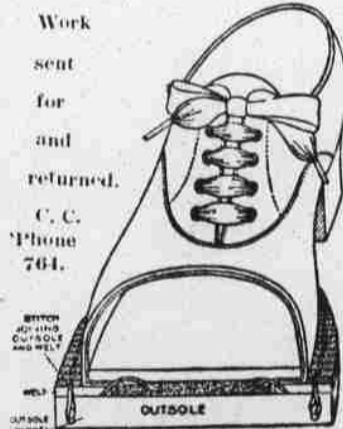
