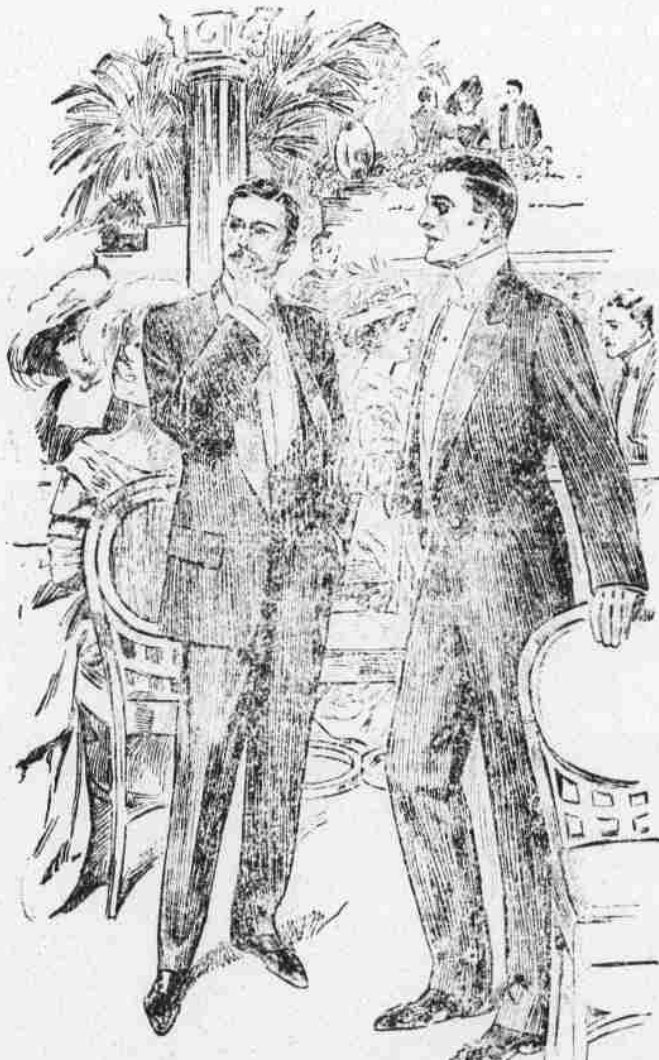

## J. R. UPCHURCH DEAD

Constable, Justice of the Peace and Game Warden

Was One of Best Known Citizens of County—Dies Result of Stroke of Paralysis at Fair Grounds Last Thursday—Funeral Tomorrow.

Mr. John R. Upchurch, one of the best known men in Wake county, and for many years a constable, justice of the peace and state game warden, died at his home, 295 South Swain street, this morning at 5:30 as the result of paralysis. He was stricken at the fair grounds last Thursday afternoon, was carried home and never left his bed. He was born near Morrisville, February 23, 1851, and was therefore, nearly sixty-two years of age.

Mr. Upchurch was an active man, possessed a strong personality and readily won friends. For twenty years he was constable of Raleigh township and eighteen years ago was terribly wounded in attempting to arrest John Allen Johnson, a white man. Johnson fired a bullet into Mr. Upchurch's left side, near the heart, and the deceased never quite recovered from the wound. He had suffered from rheumatism at intervals before and since the wounding.

Mr. Upchurch was appointed state game warden several years ago and held this position until three years ago, when the legislature practically abolished the office. For the last eight years he had been a justice of the peace and was one of the best in the county.

He was not a member of any secret order. He was first a member of the First Baptist church, but later removed his membership to the Tabernacle. The funeral will be conducted from the residence tomorrow afternoon at 3:30 by Dr. T. W. O'Kelly, pastor of the First Baptist church. Interment will follow in the city cemetery.

Mr. Upchurch was twice married—the first time to Miss Melissa Bagwell. From that union three children survive, Mrs. W. D. Beale, Wilmington; Mr. Ira Upchurch, Americus, Ga.; and Mrs. J. B. Angel, Macon, Ga. Mr. Upchurch's second wife was Miss Emma Wicker, who with the following children, survives: Mrs. Lee Howard, Norlina; Mr. E. T. Upchurch, Miss Lottie Upchurch and Master Pearson Upchurch, Raleigh. He is also survived by the following brothers and sister: Messrs. William B. and C. F. Upchurch, Morrisville; J. B. Upchurch, Cary; L. M. Upchurch, Silver Springs, Fla.; Pat Upchurch, Apex; and Mrs. Cues Morgan, New Hill.

The pallbearers will be Messrs. J. J. Bernard, Armistead Jones, E. P. Maynard, Bart M. Gatling, E. M. Bledsoe, J. H. Sears, K. O. Pool and J. C. L. Harris.

## ANSON COUNTY MAN IS GRANTED PARDON.

Governor Kitchin today granted a conditional pardon to Burk Rollins, convicted in Anson county in April, 1910, of selling liquor and sentenced to twelve months on the roads. The governor in his reasons for granting the pardon says:

"A strong application for the pardon of this prisoner last March was presented. Since then those in charge of the prosecution, and who opposed pardon have withdrawn their opposition and now join in the application for clemency. The trial judge and the solicitor ask that the sentence be reduced by a pardon. A majority of the jury and a great many good citizens join in the request for clemency. I therefore pardon prisoner on condition that he remain law abiding and of good behavior."

## MEET DEATH TOMORROW IN THE ELECTRIC CHAIR.

Norval Marshall, the negro who committed a criminal assault on Mrs. Joseph Choplin in Warren county September 16, will be electrocuted in the penitentiary tomorrow. Everything for the execution was got in readiness and there will be little to do tomorrow except to adjust the prisoner in the chair and turn on the current. A number of spectators will be present to witness the execution.

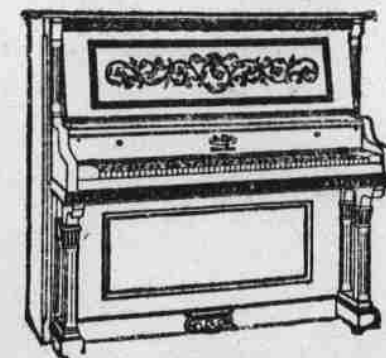
