

# LITTLE DOING IN THE COURT

## All Cases On Calendar Settled Without Trial By Jury--Judgments Signed

Wake Superior Court met at 10 o'clock this morning and adjourned at 10:30 until tomorrow at 9:30. All the cases set for today were compromised or settled out of court and all Judge Peebles had to do was to sign judgments. The motion calendar was gone over today, but was not disposed of.

A consent judgment in the case of C. H. Williamson, administrator of Sharp Pitts, vs. the North Carolina Railroad and Southern Railway was signed, the plaintiff recovering \$250.

In the case of W. W. Williams vs. the Raleigh and Southport the amount recovered was not specified. A consent judgment was signed in the case of H. B. Edwards vs. the Western Union, the plaintiff getting \$300.

Tomorrow the case of Dr. J. J. L. McCullers against the board of county commissioners will be heard at chambers.

The Collins' Grove school in Holly Springs township opened last Monday with an enrollment of 19 pupils on the first day. Miss Martha Winter is principal and Miss Harriet Grills is primary teacher.

Superintendent Judd has returned from Olive Grove, near Light township, where Saturday he attended a farmers' union picnic and made an address on "The Two Great Objects of the Farmers' Union--Education for Better Methods in Farming, Organization and Co-operation in Buying and Selling." A large crowd was present and a fine dinner was served.

The Wakelon High School, under the management of Principal E. H. Moser, has started out well this year. In every department there seems to be new life. Mr. Moser has made application to Superintendent Judd for rye and clover seed preparatory to planting a school farm in cotton next spring. The Wakelon school committee consists of D. D. Massey, chairman; M. B. Chamblee, secretary and R. B. Nichols for the elementary schools; Dr. G. M. Bell, chairman; Dr. J. A. Strickland, secretary, and Mr. T. J. Horton for the high school. All

of these are wide-awake and active men and the school is destined to continue to grow under their administration.

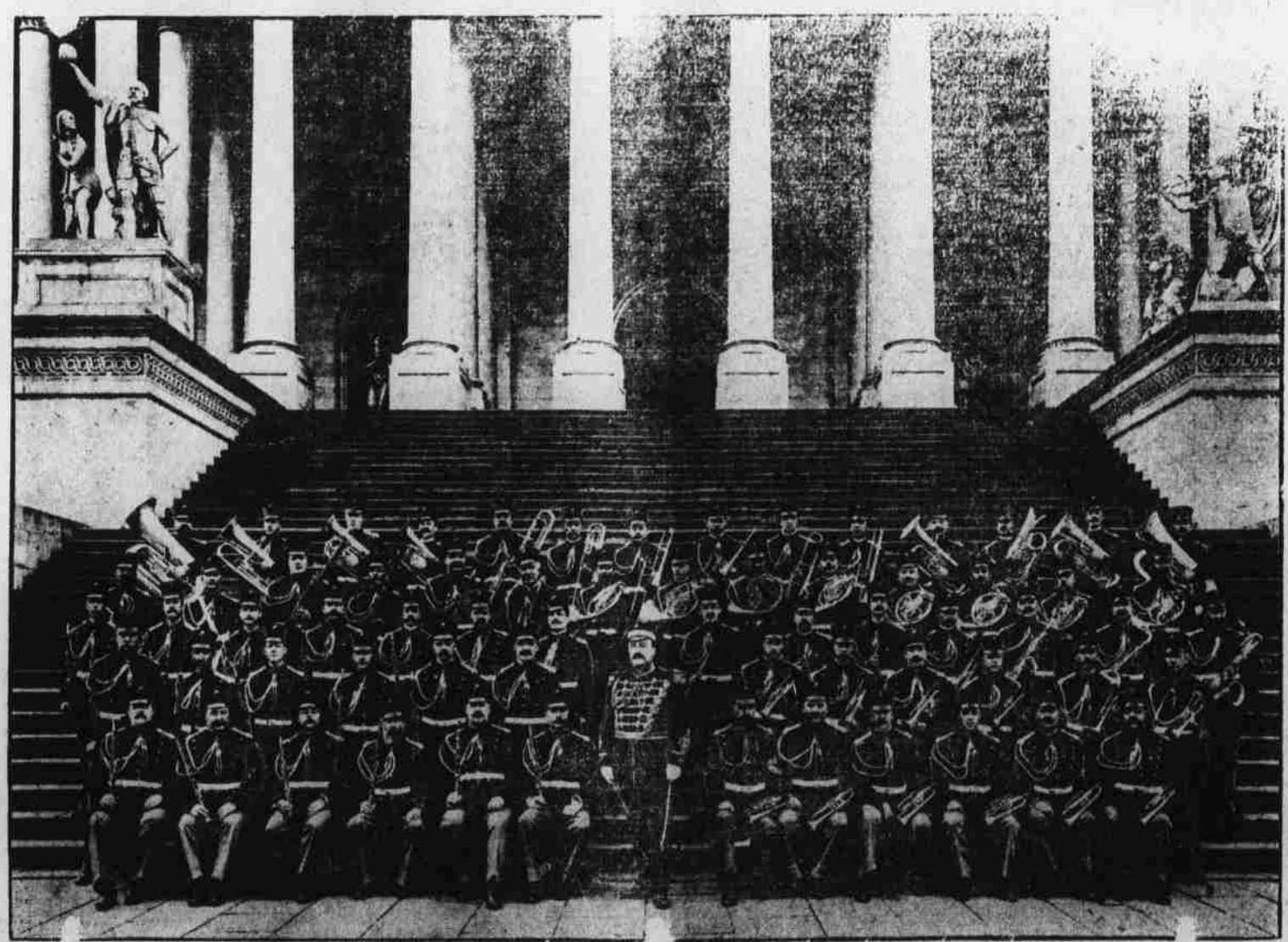
