NARROW ESCAPE HAD Walter Scott Knocked Down By Street Car

Was Laying Brick When Car Struck Him and Ran Over Him-J. L. Strickland Made Assistant Secretary of Y. M. C. A .- Negro Had Head Beat Up.

Wilmington, Dec. 1-Mr. Walter Scott, an expert bricklayer in the employment of the Southern Paving & Construction Company, which concern holds a number of contracts for to sell. Buying largely by shorts in street paving here, had a narrow escape from being killed yesterday when he was knocked down by street car at the intersection of Fifth and Princess streets. His head was badly cut and lacerated by the force of the blow. Those who witnessed the accident stated that his escape from a horrible death seemed almost miraculous.
