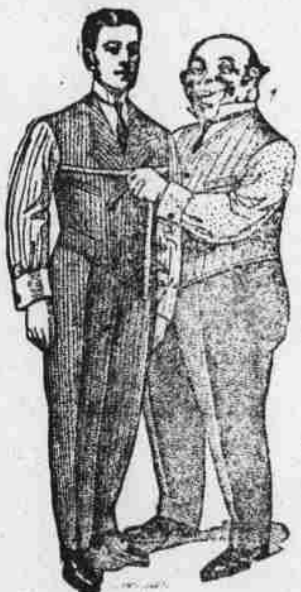

PROGRAM OF TAFT Five Minutes Sometimes Makes A Big Difference

Legislative Outline For the Present Congress

Three Important Features, Amendments to the Sherman Law, Tariff Revision and Arbitration—He is Satisfied that the Sherman Law Needs Amending.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 4.—President Taft's legislative program for this session of congress will contain three important features. Of course there will be other matters which he would like to have the house and senate consider and act favorably upon, but he is preparing to concentrate his influence and energies upon three principal ideas. They are: Amendments to the Sherman anti-trust law, making them act more specific in its application. Tariff revision based upon the reports of the tariff board as now being drafted.

Arbitration between the United States and Great Britain, and the United States and France upon the basis of the treaties now negotiated.

Since the president returned to Washington from his long tour of the western states he has reached definite conclusions upon the matter of more anti-trust legislation. For a time he hesitated to settle upon a policy. He had argued in many of his speeches that the Sherman act, as now drawn, is sufficient. All that was necessary, he said, was strict enforcement.

Now, however, Mr. Taft is of another mind. He is satisfied that the Sherman law needs amending. He agrees with the most learned lawyers in the country that the Sherman law does not define the limits a corporation may or may not do. It leaves too much for the courts to do in making it necessary for every combination to go through the legal mill before it stands convicted of this, too much for the courts to do in making it more definite in its prohibitions.

He will couple with his anti-trust amendment his plan for the federal incorporation of all concerns engaged in interstate commerce. From the time he became the executive head of the nation Mr. Taft has urged federal incorporation as a remedy for many of the abuses now charged to monopolies. Such a plan he believes, will throw open to inspection by the government all books of corporations, and will thereby make investigation easy.

One other matter of legislation related to the anti-trust program, but not exactly involved in the amendments supported by the administration, is the federal regulation of stock and bond issues of transportation companies. A commission appointed by the president, has made a report finding that the public has been called upon to pay dividends upon vast accounts of watered stock, and that a physical valuation of railroads is necessary in order to determine how much money the government should permit them to make. A special recommendation will accompany this report to congress.

The president now expects to submit two special messages upon the tariff. One of them will discuss the results of the tariff board's investigation into the wool schedule of the Payne-Aldrich tariff act, and the other the inquiry into the cotton schedule. If the board is able to make any further reports during the present session of congress, they will be

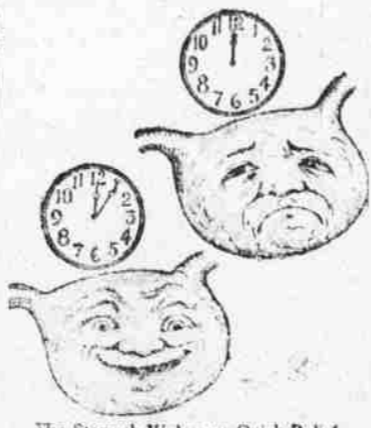

The subject of tariff reform recommendations.

Euphatic statements have been made by Mr. Taft to the effect that he will veto any tariff revision bills that are not based upon investigations by the tariff board. His friend believes, too, that he will be uncompromising in this position, and that the democratic-invariant coalition in the senate hope to enact any tariff bills into law they will have to keep this declaration from the white noise in mind.

Speaker Clark and other leading democrats have announced that the tariff will furnish the basis for the whole fight in this session. They have not so far, however, said whether or not they mean to bait Mr. Taft by ignoring the tariff board, and by putting up to him again the measures which encountered the presidential veto during the extra session.

Another struggle with the senate over the ratification of the arbitration treaties is promised. The president has made his threatened appeal to the country in behalf of these conventions. He has told scores of audiences that there is no reason in the technical objection which the senate committee on foreign relations has found to the pacts negotiated during the extra session.

This objection was founded upon the theory that the ratification of the two treaties meant a curtailment of the constitutional power of the senate to approve or disapprove of all international agreements. The senate committee has so far refused to recede from this opinion, and the president has shown no disposition to change the terms of the treaties. Thus far, therefore, the senate and the president are deadlocked, and before any outcome can be foreseen it will be necessary to wait to determine the effect of the president's campaign for his treaties before the country.
