Glad Hand of Welcome Extended New Pastor of Tabernacle Last Night

Mr. N. B. Broughton then took charge of the meeting and introduced the men who gave the various welcomes to the new pastor.

Mr. A. A. Thompson.

On behalf of the business interests of the city Mr. A. A. Thompson gave a most hearty welcome to Rev. Charles E. Maddry. He declared that the business people appreciate the efforts of this church and gladly welcomed its new pastor. This is the educational center, moral center and home city of the state. Faithful service has been done for the city of Raleigh in every fight for the morals of the city. He declared that every man will be at his elbow in any and all of his labors. Like the children of Israel held up the hands of Moses while the great battle was being won by the Israelites, he could count upon his people holding up his hands in the time of battle. You have here a Sunday school that is without a superior in the south, whose leaders know how to work. Mr. Thompson emphasized the fact that all the Christian people of the city are united when furthering Christ's cause among us. So on behalf of the business men and of the First Presbyterian church, of which he is a member, a most hearty welcome was extended.

Rev. Livingston Johnson.

On behalf of the Baptists of the city Mr. Maddry was welcomed by Rev. Livingston Johnson. He said peculiar relations existed between himself and the new pastor. At his request Mr. Maddry was given a mission station in Greensboro six years ago and on account his untiring efforts, Forrest Avenue Church was built and today it has something over 250 members. He told of the work done by Mr. Maddry in Greensboro and in Statesville. A most hearty welcome he extended him on behalf of the Baptists of Raleigh, the home of Baptist activities; here is Meredith College and near here is Wake Forest College. A day of promise is at hand for the churches here. He went into the struggles undergone by the different churches of this city. He congratulated the church in securing such a man as its pastor. He must anchor here in the state of the long leaf pine, best state the sun shines upon.

On behalf of the Sunday school, Mr. N. B. Broughton extended a cordial welcome. He said it was talked abroad that this church had a mark on the wall by which it measured its pastors and when Mr. Massey came here he reached the mark standing 6 foot 2 1/2 inches, he was followed by Mr. Moncrief who went beyond the mark measuring 6 foot 3 inches. Now comes Mr. Maddry who eclipses all by measuring 6 foot 4 inches.

Mr. Broughton gave a brief history of the church and its struggles, from its small beginning out on Swain street and culminating in the present handsome structure, on Hargett street.

He gave some figures, showing 4,500 people in the city in Sunday schools while there are 6,500 out of Sunday schools, giving a good working basis along these lines.

On behalf of the church, Mr. R. N. Simms, chairman of the board of deacons, spoke. He pledged the board, choir, boys and girls and men and women of the congregation at the new pastor's command, to go anywhere, anytime that he should call. He said that the new pastor was welcomed into places of business, offices, stores, banks, homes and everywhere; even into our own hearts, joys and sorrows and into our entire life.

Just as Mr. Simms closed Rev. A. M. Simms stepped forward and announced that a marriage was to take place. The bride had been a widow a few months, had been married about ten times, but needed another husband. "Here and now," he declared, "I pronounce the new pastor and this church man and wife."
