

EXCHANGE TO NEW BERN

Builders' Exchange Selects New Bern For July Meeting—Banquet Last Night

The North Carolina Builders' Exchange spent a lively and busy session yesterday afternoon attending to purely business affairs, hearing reports, out-lining plans and pledging themselves together to make the coming year the best since its organization. The finance committee, in making its annual report, showed that the Exchange is in a flourishing condition financially, that it has met every obligation, and the treasury was not emptied.

Meet in New Bern.
There were several invitations from various cities asking that the July sessions be held with them, but New Bern was chosen. The nominating committee named the old set of officers for next year and they were unanimously elected. They are J. A. Jones, of Charlotte, president; N. Underwood, of Durham, vice-president; E. P. Tingley, of Charlotte, secretary-treasurer.

Banquet Last Night.
The meeting came to an end with an elaborate banquet last night in the dining-rooms of the Yarrowborough Hotel. It was well prepared and one of the most enjoyable affairs ever held in Raleigh. A spirit of fellowship existed among the "boys" rarely seen. Everyone vied with the other in making it one of justification and they were continually hunking back and forth at each repartee that kept the fun at high tide. The banquet was not one of those cut and dried affairs, with about a half-dozen on the program for toasts and the others composing the audience, but all were free to say just what they pleased, tell all the good jokes they desired. Mr. J. A. Jones, president of the Exchange, acted as toastmaster, or probably better, master of ceremonies and he kept the crowd laughing with his wit and humor. He called on almost everyone in the room for a speech, not even allowing the press representatives to escape without saying something. With all standing and glasses clinking in fours, a toast was drunk to the North Carolina Builders Exchange.

A roar of applause and laughter was heard when Mr. W. B. Barrow called on Mr. James R. McClamrock, of Greensboro, designating him as the "phonograph of the Exchange." He stood up and, waving his handkerchief, declared that "I never desert my colors, boys, white is for purity," which was received with another outburst of applause. He declared that every meeting of the Exchange gets better and better, and this year the climax was reached, for it was undoubtedly the best ever held. He told of the struggles the Exchange has gone through since its organization a few years ago, gathering more strength as the years came and go, until now it has reached the place where it takes a commanding position among the organizations of the state. He asked that every member pledge to secure two or more members by the next meeting.

Led by R. E. Plier, of Durham, a toast was drunk to N. L. Walker, who laid the plans for this successful banquet.
Mr. Walker asked that all stand and drink to the health, future and prosperity of the Builders Exchange, which was done. He declared his great pleasure in having the "boys" in Raleigh, and hoped for an increased attendance in New Bern. Space forbids mentioning all who spoke, because practically every one had something to say. It might be said that the keynote of the entire speech-making was for more loyalty among the membership and a desire to do greater things the coming year.

TWENTY-ONE DEATHS IN STATE FROM FIRES.

Insurance Commissioner Jas. H. Young says that from accounts kept by him last year there were twenty-one deaths in North Carolina from fires, and that already he has seen in the papers this year reports of two deaths. The commissioner says that at least two-thirds or three-fourths of the fires are preventable, and it is a question of how long our people will be careless and unconcerned about the fire waste when it is not only needlessly destroying their property but the lives of our people. The laws of the state have made ample provision for the proper erection of buildings and the repeated inspection of those already erected, and there is no reason why the officers in the state should not carry out these laws and receive the aid of every citizen of the state.

R. N. Simms and Jas. M. Templeton, Jr., appeared for the defendant. Solicitor Norris was aided by Chas. F. Harris. Mr. Templeton is one of the youngest members of the bar, having his office in Cary, and his speech was highly complimented as being one of the best delivered in some time.

COMPLAINT IS FILED IN AUTO DAMAGE SUIT.

The complaint in the suit of Rufus J. Hamilton against Henry C. Bridgers, of Tarboro, for the injury of Emma Hamilton by an automobile in September last, has been filed in Wake superior court. The complaint sets forth that the child was permanently injured as the result of being struck by the automobile and that her mind was impaired. Damages in the sum of \$20,000 are asked.



QUEEN WILHELMINA AND DAUGHTER.

The Hague, Holland, Jan. 11.—The Dutch sark is hovering over the palace occupied by Holland's beloved ruler, Queen Wilhelmina and her King Consort, Prince Henry of Mecklenburg-Schwerin, and is expected to alight early in March. The Queen and Prince were married on February 7th, 1901 and have one daughter born on April 30th, 1909.

FOR LOCATION OF CENTRAL WAREHOUSE

The advisory council of the State Farmers' Union met with President H. E. Litchford and Secretary Fred A. Oils of the chamber of commerce today with reference to the location here of a central warehouse for the storing of cotton. No action was taken, and the committee does not propose to take any action, until it has received propositions from the half-dozen other towns in the state. The meeting today was merely for the purpose of receiving expressions and finding out what would be done.
This afternoon the council met behind closed doors in the senate chamber. The members present are: Dr. H. Q. Alexander, Mecklenburg; Dr. J. M. Templeton, Wake; J. Z. Green, Union; J. R. Reeves, Lee; J. P. Coggins, Chatham; W. H. Moore, Pitt; W. B. Gibson, Iredell; W. B. Crowder, Wake. It was announced that the visiting committee would visit the various bidding towns before definitely selecting a location. The advisory council may continue in session tomorrow.

FEWER CORPORATIONS IN 1911 THAN IN 1910.

Due, doubtless to the federal-law regulating corporations and the North Carolina method of taxing them, the number of certificates of incorporation issued by the secretary of state during the year 1911 amounted to 976 as against 1,058 for the previous year. The decrease was 82.
