

bern, to Beaufort, and west from Salisbury, to the Tennessee line; and report by bill or otherwise.

Mr. Steele introduced a bill to incorporate Rockingham Division, No. 32, S. of T. in Rockingham, Richmond co.; and Mr. W. McNeill a bill for the better application of the Common School fund; which were severally read the first time and referred to their respective Committees.

Mr. McLean, a bill to establish a new county by the name of Yarkin; read first time and passed and referred.

On motion of Mr. Maulsby, ordered, that the Doorkeeper be directed to cause the flag of the State to be hoisted over this House, while the General Assembly may be in session.

Mr. Pegram introduced a bill to incorporate the Fayetteville and Central Plank Road. Read first time and passed and ordered to be printed.

Mr. Blow presented the following Preamble and Resolution:

WHEREAS, The series of acts passed at the last session of Congress, and known as the Compromise, although they did not meet our approbation fully, have become the law of the land, and, as such ought to be obeyed; and whereas, the Fugitive Slave Law was all that was gained by the South, in return for the surrender of important rights;

Therefore, be it resolved, that should said law be repealed, or essentially modified by Congress, or not enforced by the National Executive, or nullified, or made inoperative, by the people of the North, we will be in favor of a dissolution of the Union.

Which was read, and on motion of Mr. Blow referred to the Joint Select Committee on Slavery.

On motion of Mr. Rayner, Resolved, That the Committee on the Judiciary be instructed to inquire, and report, by bill, resolution, or otherwise, whether the Bank of Fayetteville, in issuing bills of the denomination of \$1 and \$2, has not acted in contravention of its charter, and the general law of the State.

On motion of Mr. Saunders, Resolved, that a message be sent to the Senate, proposing to raise a Joint Select Committee of 13, 7 from the House and 6 on the part of the Senate, to inquire into the propriety of having an appropriate inscription made on the block of marble, designed for the Washington Monument. And, ordered that the Committee of Finance, to whom was heretofore referred the subject, as a part of the Governor's message, be discharged from its consideration.

Mr. S. P. Hill presented a Bill to increase the Revenue of the State, and to amend the last Act on this subject. Referred to Committee on Finance.

Mr. Webb, a Resolution in relation to the Common School Fund in the hands of the former Sheriff of Polk. Referred to Committee on Claims.

Mr. Steele, a Resolution instructing Finance Committee to inquire into the meaning of the term "safely secured," in the first section of the Act of 1848-'49, to increase Revenue of the State. Adopted.

Sundry messages were received from the Senate, announcing who compose their Committees on certain subjects, &c. [One among the number—proposing to raise a Joint Select Committee on R. & G. R. Road—was laid on the table. Mr. Rayner submitted a few remarks, in this connection, to the effect that the course of proceeding of the Senate, in the premises, was unparliamentary.]

Mr. Martin moved that the Committee on Internal Improvements be discharged from the further consideration of the subject of the Raleigh and Gaston Rail Road. Negatived.

Mr. Stubbs introduced a Bill to repeal the 1st and 2nd sec. of the Act of 48-'9, Chap. 56, entitled "an Act concerning the President and Directors of the Literary Fund.

Mr. Avery moved the reconsideration of a motion, previously made by Mr. Hayes, and adopted, requiring all bills of a public nature thereafter introduced to be printed. [Whereupon, a playful discussion arose between himself and Mr. Hayes. Mr. Hayes was finally called to order, but merrily held on. Mr. Dargan moved that half the bills be printed in Cherokee. The Speaker again called to order; Mr. Avery's motion to reconsider was adopted, and Mr. Hayes' proposition was then laid on the table.]

Mr. Cherry, a resolution instructing the Judiciary Committee to enquire into the meaning of that clause of the Revenue Act of 1848-9, relating to the listing bonds by guardians, belonging to their wards. The Bill introduced by Mr. Erwin, on Friday, to secure the more faithful observance of the Constitution of the U. S. &c. was referred to the Joint Select Committee on Slavery.

On motion of Mr. Jones, the House adjourned.

INDIAN MURDERS IN HAYWOOD.

We are pained to learn that a few days since, an Indian called at the house of an Indian widow woman in Haywood, where there was no one but herself and a little daughter, and requested her to let him stay all night. She gave consent. During the night the woman was cruelly murdered, robbed of \$8 00 in money, her wearing apparel, &c., and the house fired and burnt to the ground! The little girl was roused, and fortunately escaped the flames, gave the alarm, but too late. The remains of the woman were found in the fire. Search was made, and a part of the money found in possession of the man; and the clothes, &c., were sold in the neighborhood for LIQUOR, that curse of the world. The old lady had a son in the mountains, who came home and learned the facts, and Indian like, thirsted for revenge. Wm. H. Thomas, Esq., was holding a sort of council in the neighborhood where the son went, and seeing the murderer, he walked deliberately up to him without saying a word, lifted his arm, and plunged a knife to the hilt in his side! Two brothers of the wounded man were then about to take vengeance on the son, but were prevented by Mr. Thomas and others. It is thought they will kill him yet. He was arrested and bail taken for his appearance at the Spring Court. The wounded man died soon after, and doubtless justly.—Asheville Messenger.

THE MEETING IN PRINCE GEORGE.

MEETING OF THE LEGISLATURE—Gov. QUITMAN'S MESSAGE.—The Legislature of this State met in extra session yesterday, to consider the wrongs of the South. Much feeling exists among the members.

The Governor's message was transmitted and read. After giving a history of the wrongs of the South, he says let the proposition be distinctly made of the non-slaveholding States, to remedy the wrongs so far as it may be in the power of Congress to do so, by obtaining from California concession of south of 36 degrees 30 minutes, or otherwise to consent to such amendments of the Constitution as shall hereafter secure the rights of the slaveholding States from misconstruction and further aggressions. But, in the event of refusal to do so, I shall not hesitate to express my decided opinion that the only effectual remedy to the evils which must continue to grow, from year to year, is to be found in prompt and peaceable secession of the aggrieved States.
