DISRESPECT TO THE JUDICIAL AU-

THORITY. At Mecklenburg Superior Court, on the 13th inst., Capt. Green W. Caldwell was tried for an assault with a revolver on Rufus Barringer, Esq., during the last Election canvass. Caldwell was found guilty, and Judge Settle sentenced him to 20 day's imprisonment. Whereupon, as we learn from the Hornet's Nest, "the excitement among Caldwell's friends was intense. Hundreds would have stepped between the judgment and its exedetermined, but it soon came to be understood that it was entirely contrary to Mr. Caldwell's wishes and views that, any thing of the kind should be undertaken; he preferring to obey the high behests of the law,

to making any resistance to its demands." Subsequently, on the evening of Mr. Caldwell's commitment to prison, a number of persons united in an invitation to a public dinner, complaining, in their letter to him, that the penalties of the law had "fallen unjustly upon him," and declaring that "they had seen nothing in his conduct which should consign him to the walls of a prison." The newspaper says that this feeling was univer-

sal. We desire to say nothing as to the affray between Messrs. Caldwell and Barringer, except that the long account published by "Many friends of Maj. G. W. Caldwell," makes out such a case as seems to us to be inconsistent with the finding of a verdict by a Jury against Caldwell. We are therefore account. The finding of the Jury negatives the idea of such a justification as the case presented by his friends would show. And after such a finding, no impartial man can wonder that an upright Judge should sentence the defendant to imprisonment. We have heard it declared from the Bench, and we confess with entire approbation, that imprisonment should invariably follow every conviction for an assault with deadly weapons. We applauded the resolution of that Judge: feeling convinced that it was necessary, in order to prevent the carrying of arms, he will be prompt to fulfil all orders from town or and the consequent frequent commission of murder. And what is there in the character and standing of Major Caldwell, which should exempt him from the penalty of the law? Shall a poor devil be sent to jail for shooting his fellow being, and Maj. Caldwell be exempted from that unpleasant penalty? Who ever thought of interposing to prevent the former from being carried to jail, or of offering him a public dinner? True Maj. Caldwell is a man of high character, and a Senator in the State Legislature: But these are only reasons why he should respect the laws which he himself helped to make; and not reasons why he should be exempted from their operation.

For ourself, we respect the Judge who performed his duty, without respect to persons. The only drawback to this feeling is the fact that he afterwards gave way to the public feeling, and remitted the sentence after Maj. Caldwell had been in prison a day and two nights. > It is the duty and interest of all good citizens to uphold the laws, as fairly administered by Court and Jury. And therefore we cannot but look with regret upon the conduct of the people and press of Mecklenburg in this matter. It could perhaps hardly be expected of Maj. Caldwell that he should rebuke their expressions, but considerate men in other parts of this State cannot fail to do so .- Fay. Observer.
