## CENSUS-APPORTIONMENT.

The Raleigh Register considers it certain hat our State will lose two members of Congress under the Apportionment of Represenlation to be fixed at the next Session of Congress. Though this was regarded as probaour population would not be more than about 50,000 to 75,000 , yet we are now in: clined to believe, that with an increase of out 120,000 , we shall lose but one member. The Register assumes that the entire popula-
tion of the United States will bc 23,000000 , and that, to constitute a House of 233 mem ers, the apportionment of population for each nember will be $\mathbf{1 0 0 , 0 0 0}$. But the Register verlooked the fact, that of the $23,000,000$. (even supposing the entire population to reach that, which we doubt, there will be more than $3,000,000$ of slaves, sce., of whom
only three fifths will be counted as federal only three fifths will be counted as federal representative population. This would
reduce the $23,000,000$ to perhaps $21,800,000$ ofuce the $23,000,000$ to perhaps 21,800,000
of Federal population. An apportionment of 100,000 to each member would therefore make the House consist of only 218 mem bers. To make 233 menabers out of that Representative population, the apportionment North Carolina eight members, if her repes entative population prove to be, as it doubtess will, 740,000 to 750,000 . Eight members, at 93,562 each, would require a Federal population of 748,496 , just about the number our State will evidently have. But suppose our federal population should
fall short of that, by 20 , or 30,000 , still our surplus over the number necessary for seven members would be so large as to enWe think eighth.
he U.S. will be materill population of 000,000 . In 1840 it was $17,069,453$, the general estimate is of an increase of 30 per cent. equal to $5,120,835$; of $22,190,288$. The increase in our population, in 48 counties out of 79, is 67,844 . The population in these counties is 480 .889. The remainder of the counties have probably
