Several engrossed bills from the Senate

The following bills were read the third time and passed, viz: a bill to improve the Deep River and Yadkin River and to connect the same by a Portage Rail Road; a bill to incorporate the Neuse River Navigation Company-[amended, on motion of Mr. Rayner, by inserting a proviso that the Public Treasurer shall not pay the amount appropriated for said work until the North attended to, at moderate prices. Their Stables are on Wilmington Street, just to the East of Market Square. to lay off and improve a public road from the town of Salisbury to the town of Rock ford in the county of Surry ; a bill to improve Haw River; a bill to incorporate the Anson Plank Road Company; a bill to amend an act entitled an act to amend an act passed in the year 1833, to incorporate the Wilmin ton and Raleigh Rail Road Company; and bill to amend an act passed at the session of Sous of Temperance, Rechabites, American 1848-'9, entitled an act to provide for Mechanics, Druids, Red Mens. and all other societies Turnpike from Salisbury West to the line of the State of Georgia.

The hill to incorporate the Raleigh and Gaston Rail Road Company having been

Therefore, be it Resolved, that the Go nor of this State be requested to send to the Governor of Vermont the afore Resolutions for the promotion of peace, with the declaration that North Carolina knows too well what is due to heraelf to receive from said Sister State Resolutions of that character, when the State, so adopting and trans mitting them, has been the first in the Confederacy to assume to herself the right of violating the Constitution of the U.S. and
