English Account EGYPTIAN AFFAIRS.

By a veffel atrived at Bolton in 35 days from Gibraltar.

Gibrahar, April 17, 18or. Yesterday arrived from Aboukir, in 28 days, his Majefty's hired armed brig Louis, Truscott, from whom we have the following information. The British army under Sir Ralph

Abercrombie, arrived in Aboukir Bay on the 2d of March, but did not attempt to disembark, on account of tempestuous weather until the 8th, when a landing was effected by 7000 men, under a heavy fire from artillery and small arms. The French made a vigorous opposition, advancing to the beach and actually levelling muskets over the gun wales of the boats; but the British soldiers, leaping on shore, attacked the enemy with the bayonet, made good their debarkation and drove the French about two miles towards Alexandria, and into the castle of Aboukir; taking from them 8 pieces

of cannon. Our loss in killed and wounded this day is computed to amount to 400 or 500 men; and the enemy's about the same. Among the corps which made this first landing were the guards, 28th, 42d, 90th, and que regiments. Our troops were reinforced the same evening by 5000 more men who landed afterwards; and having established themselves in this position, they remained until the 13th of March, when a general action took place, which terminated in the total route of the French, and four pieces of cannon being captured by the English, who lost about 1000 men in this affair : but by accounts from prifoners, the lofs of the French was

On the 14th, the attack commenged upon the castle of Aboukir, and on the 18th, that garrison furrendered to the British forces, all the guns except two, having been dilmounted by the fire from our

When the Youifa left Egypt, the British 2rmy wa posted within two miles of Alexandra; and the French, supposed to be about 6000 firong, were entrenched on the heights at Pompey's Pillar faid o command Alexandria. The Britin were occupied in difembarking thir field. train of battering cannon, twethirds of which were already on hore; an attack upon the French Amp was expected very foon to begle; hen it was supposed there could little doubt of the event being as brious to Buitain as the precedgadions had proved. The French ad at first miltaken the 42d regient in the Highland drefs, for urks, and attacked them with their usual confidence; but were received with a gallantry and Ipirit, which they did not expect, and probably had not been accuitomed to. The Highlanders ebayonets; in their turn made a brifk charge; checked, and completely worsted that part of the French army opposed to them.

It is further reported that Murad Bey and his followers have attacked the French at Cairo, and prevented Menou from joining his forces at Alexandria, where all the roll of the French troops had been oncentrated. Certain accounts ad arrived that the Grand Vizier wh his army had marched towards Delta about the 20th of February

One of the Lieutenants of his Majelty's thip Swiftfure, writes as follows to his friends in Gibraltar, dated 17th March:

"Our gallant army is only waiting for the heavy attiliery to attack the enemy's height near Alexandria, which must immediately fall on our becoming mafters of this height, as it entirely commands the town."

Sir John Warren fell in with and chaced the foundron under Admiral Gantheame, on the 21st of March, but loft fight of them in the night. They were feen on the 4th of April, by his Majesty's brig of war the Mutene, off the illand of Sardinia, fleering North-east. Two of the line of battle ships had lost their foremalls,
